Thanks for the February meeting program presentation goes to Neil Johnson, WBØEMU. Neil demonstrated the portable paging equipment used by the American Telephone System (ATS), and explained its operation and capabilities. In demonstrating the voice pager, Dave, WDØ-DLN, called the central ATS office with his two-meter handheld via the 40-00 phone patch and left a voice message. Neil's voice pager was then activated, and Dave's message came "brough the portable pager loud and ear! Very impressive!

Tom, KØPQR, reported that some of the technical rules concerning code for information interchange (ASCII) on the amateur bands had been released through HR Reports. March 1980 HA It appears that maximum transmission rates for ASCII on the ham bands will be established at 300 baud below 28 MHz, 1200 baud between 28 MHz and 420 MHz, and 19,200 baud above 420 MHz, All I can say is that these speeds open up a lot of new areas for amateur experimentation and development! Nothing yet on modulation techniques or shift frequencies, but all technical rules should be finalized and released within the next six weeks. Now a rules modification to allow computers to take F.C.C. exams to become bona fide licensed operators - robot-controlled DX, anyone ??? (Think of the DX your TRS-80 could roll up during prime weekday operating hours while you're slaving away at the job trying to save a few coins to pay for the set-up)!

As a final point, the plummeting price of medium-powered microprocessor equipment, along with the F.C.C. sanctions of ASCII, has again renewed amateur interest in basic computer technology. If there is enough interest among Club members, I know of several computer types who would volunteer their time to teach a basic computer technology class, as related to amateur radio, as a Club educational project. If any of you are interested in helping to organize or attend such a class, please contact me at home, 572-9491, or via P. O. Box 291, and maybe we can get something started. I, for one, am especially interested in computerized repeater control and radio teletype applications.

#### AUCTION 1980

The Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club, Inc., will present its annual auction on April 13, 1980, at the Holiday Inn, 72nd and Grover Streets, Omaha, Nebraska. The following information and rules will be strictly enforced:

- Equipment check-in and buyer registration will begin promptly at 8.00 A the day of the auction. Equipment will not be allowed on the auction premises prior to that time.
- The auction will begin promptly at 9:00 AM the day of the auction, and will continue until the last item is sold, or until terminated by the combined ruling of the auction chairman and the President, Ak-Sar-Ben Radio Club Inc.
- All items will be sold at auction to the highest bidder, in numerical order of check-in.
- 4. The Treasurer's record of sales will be considered true and final.
- The Ak-Sar-Ben Radio Amateur Club, Inc. nor any of its members will be responsible for items lost or stolen while on the auction premises.
- There will be a minimum bid of \$5.00 on all items sold. Lots not meeting the minimum bid will be returned to the seller.
- Sellers will not be paid for items sold until the Treasurer receives payment from the buyer.
- All equipment will be sold at auction. Personal sales will not be permitted on the auction premises.
- 9. Equipment registration will be limited to 10 lots per person. Equipment in each lot will be sold at auction for one price.
- 10. Sellers residing 90 miles or more from the auction will be allowed to check in equipment between the hours of 11:00 AM and 12:00 noon the day of the auction. This equipment will receive a special tag, and will be sold at auction between the hours of 12:00 noon and 4:00 PM the day of the auction.
- Equipment will not be permitted out of the auction premises without proofof-purchase.
- Equipment remaining on the auction premises one hour after the auction has closed will become the property of Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club, Inc., and will be disposed of accordingly.

#### BUYER RULES

All buyers must register, and receive a buyer's number. Bids will not accepted from persons not displaying a buyer's card.

 Buyers must pay for each item purchased immediately after the sale. Special arrangements may be made for group payment by contacting the auction chairman.

- Buyers will not be permitted to take possession of equipment without a properly marked receipt.
- Sale of "Linear" amplifiers will be restricted to licensed Amateur Radio operators only.
- 5. Persons will not be allowed on the equipment floor without a buyer's card.
- Personal checks will be accepted only from licensed Amateur Radio Operators.

#### SELLER RULES

- A commission of 10% (ten percent) will be charged for each lot sold, up to a maximum of \$20.00 for each individual sale.
- In order to buy back an item, the seller must be the high bidder. Terms such as 'no sale' will not be allowed. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for all 'Buy Backs.'

And finally, some general comments. Please have patience, especially when it comes to dealings with the Treasurer's desk. All sales have to be verified, payments made by the buyer, and so on before the seller can be paid. If you sellers want to hurry the process along, contact each buyer of your equipment and guide him to the Treasurer's table. If you get stopped at the door and are asked for a receipt for your carry-out item, please remember that we are making an all-out effort to eliminate the theft of YOUR stuff while at the auction, so don't take it personally. Remember, your bid will not be considered without displaying a buyer's card, so stick your buyer's number in your hat, or somewhere it can be seen by the auctioneer. And, finally, call or write me to have your questions answered for anything I may not have covered here. See you on April the thirteenth...

# AN ULTRA-SENSITIVE FIELD-STRENGTH METER

There are many field strength meters available commercially, but few 'e sufficiently sensitive to be used in the recently popular QRP operations, especially to determine a beam's characteristics.

Additionally, the type of sensitive FS meter which is described here can be used to detect rf wherever it may be. This would apply to neutralization of an xmtr, to determine if the oscillator of a receiver is working, ditto the same in an xmtr and a host of other uses where you wish to determine if rf is present.

The meter shows relative rf strength only and is not linear at all. So while it may show a reading of, say, 0.5mA for an rf carrier, it will run off scale with AM modulation and also, perhaps with SSB.

However, it is sensitive. So sensitive, in fact, that it will show TV and radio signals in the air surrounding your home when used with the added antenna. This is made by straightening out a wire hanger and soldering a needle-nosed clip to one end which is bent at right angles for about 3 inches. Clipping this antenna to the uppermost end of the antenna coil (in the CB handie-talkie replacement antenna) will provide sufficient pickup for the FS to work.

Almost any diode can be used in 'ace of the 1N34A which, however, worked the best. But the 2N3391 cannot be replaced with any of the common substitutes. GE makes the 2N3391 and it is available here from Hamilton Electronic Sales, 10912 W. Washington Blvd. for about 49¢ each. The rf choke can be a miniature such as the Miller 70F253A1. The 0.001 uF capacitor can be any good disc with a rating of about 100 V. The antenna and coil come as a unit and is a replacement for CB handy-talkies. It contains the coil and has a spike antenna. It is mounted on a binding post, which is probably the easiest way to do it.

A single "D" cell powers the unit and the battery will last its normal shelf life, since the draw is very minute. However, to be safe and to keep the drain at its lowest, a switch is used as a part of the 1 kilo-ohm pot. Construction is straight forward and should present no difficulties. Our unit is enclosed in a mini-box which makes it handy to carry and to use.

By removing the CB antenna coil and spike, and substituting a small coil of proper size shunted by a small variable capacitor between the antenna post and ground post, a tunablesensitive FS meter is created. The coil and capacitor should cover the desired frequencies. A small antenna can then be used, clipped on the coil at the hot end.


Disposing of the antenna entirely, and substituting a short piece of wire, will make the meter into a sensitive "sniffer" which is handy to use around the shack. The length of the sniffing wire must be kept as short as possible while still working so as not to read extraneous rf fields.
