






OMAHA, November 29 — What happens when a major U.S. corporation is mentioned in widespread rumors about industrial safety? The backlash of misinformation can be staggering.

In the past five months, Union Pacific Railroad has fielded numerous inquiries regarding the safety of butane cigarette lighters A story is making the rounds that two UP welders were killed in railroad shops when lighters exploded in their pockets. Most of the accounts end with the statement that a butane lighter contains the same amount of force as three sticks of dynamite.

The accounts are false. No one at Union Pacific has sustained any injury, much less died, as a result of this type of accident. In fact UP has no record of any accident involving a cigarette lighter of any sort. Checks with the Federal Railroad Administration, the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Association of American Railroads have failed to turn up any evidence of an accident on any American Railroad. Further inquiries to the Consumer Products Safety Commission and the National Injury Information Clearinghouse have also drawn blanks. But this has done little to stop the rumors.

Two major U.S. newspapers, with a combined circulation that reaches 1,322,934 people have carried the story, complete with Union Pacific's name. The story has also turned up on a widely listened-to, nationally syndicated radio news program. Many majo businesses, associations and agencies are circulating the story via internal safety bulletins and executive memos.

When asked to verify the story, UP safety director, Carl Mayer has said, "It just didn't happen. UP certainly doesn't endorse butane lighters, or any other product, for that matter. But we are deeply concerned when our name is used in such a reckless story."

A fairly straight forward statement. But in many many cases the story ran without anyone ever calling to check.

Most calls have come after a safety bulletin or memo was released. Extensive research by UP has failed to turn up an original source for the story. In each case it was based on hearsay and personal opinion. Not much to go on for such a serious charge.

And the stories persist. Calls still come regularly to UP from concerned safety directors and reporters alike. It seems that some rumors die hard.

DIP METER





Inductive coupling and capacitive coupling (using capacitance probe)

70 (2¾)W×180 (7½)H×45 (1¾)D mm (inch) 690g (1.52 lbs.) with accessories

A dip meter is used for adjustment of radio equipment and antennas

The DM-81 is a self-excited oscillator designed for external coupling to the equipment being tested.

It features both inductive and capacitive coupling for measuring enclosed coils and toroidal coils (patent pending). This is not possible with conventional testing instruments.

The DM-81 has the following two functions:


As shown (Fig. A), place the coil unit of the dip meter in close proximity to the circuit being measured

Adjust the dial. When the dip meter oscillation frequency coincides with the resonant frequency (tuned circuit), oscillating energy is absorbed by the circuit, thus decreasing the oscillation strength

This strength is indicated on the meter. The pointer swings back momentarily at the resonant point. Since the meter pointer dips at a turied point, this instrument is called a dip meter

This is special feature of the DM-81 which is not found in any other dip meter. Resonant frequency can be checked simply by touching the capacitance probe to hot side of the resonant circuit under test, instead of coupling the DM-81's coil and measuring inductively. The frequency is read directly on the dial. (See Fig.B)

Radio equipment is miniaturized and most coils are enclosed in metal shields. Also, toroidal coils are used in many types of radio equipment, and these coils do not couple to conventional dip meters. The DM-81 has solved this problem
