That must be one of the reasons why most hams now use the ICAO phonetic alphabet.

NOVEMBER 15, 1977 BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

President Conley announced that full details on access to, and operation of, the new Club HF Station would be forthcoming shortly. Minor details remain to be worked out concerning the identification and sign-in procedures. A consensus of opinion has been expressed by the Club Station Committee, that all members who wish to use the Station in an unsupervised situation, will be required to complete a brief training session on the operation of the equipment. The Committee also stated that the Club call WØEQU will NOT be used unless there is an organized Club activity taking place such as a contest. Members will operate using their own calls and within their license class privileges. It is now expected that the station will be formally dedicated before January 1st.

The monthly Treasurer's report was read and approved. It was announced that the 1978 Club operating budget would be printed as an insert in the December issue of Ham Hum and sent to members only. Also, as per an approved motion from the membership, the year-end financial report will be compiled following Jan. 1, and will be included in the January or February issue of Ham Hum, depending on printing deadlines.

President Conley announced that the January Code and Theory classes will be held at the Jewish Community Center. This is due to a policy change at Creighton Prep regarding compensation for use of their classrooms.

December should prove to be the busiest month of the year again for Club activity. Dec. 18 has been scheduled for the annual project to provide Christmas calls for the patients at Veteran's Hospital. At the time (this writing, last minute details are being worked out for the annual "Operation Santa Claus" for hospitalized children, and the third annual "Toys for Tots" toy pick-up day. Add to that the Club Christmas Party on the 11th and the December business meeting on the 9th, and you have a full month indeed. Be sure to attend the annual business meeting as this is YOUR chance to determine WHO will shape the future of the Club in the coming year.

OSCAR 7's Mode Schedule will be changed effective January 1 to two days in Mode B for every day in Mode A, and the new schedule will be shown in W6PAJ's orbital calendar coming out in December. Ample Mode A operations will be provided by the Russian's "RS" spacecraft and AO-D, and OSCAR 7 is considerably more sensitive in Mode B than it is in Mode A.

A New Satellite Bandplan is also going into effect January 1 which will place CW only on the bottom third of the satellite downlink, mixed CW/SSB in the center third and SSB only operation on the top third — the reverse of current practice.

The Russian RS Spacecraft is now scheduled for launch at the end of October, according to word relayed from high ranking Russian Amateurs. It's also rumored the input has been changed to 145.85–145.95 to correspond with OSCAR 7's.

WHY ARES?

Why is there an Amateur Radio Emergency Service? Because we best justify our existence by serving the community in times of disaster when normal communications are not available, have failed, or are badly overburdened. The pleasure we derive from the pursuit of our hobby during normal times establishes a debit that we can offset only by determination to be prepared and willing to be of service when disaster strikes

What is ARES? ARES is a volunteer organization of Amateur Radio operators organized and dedicated to providing emergency and other public service communications. It is not restricted to ARRL members, any particular grade of licensee, residents of a particular state, city, or county, or even Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club members. Every licensed amateur is eligible for membership. The possession of emergency powered equipment is desirable, but is not a requirement. The only other qualification is a sincere desire to serve.

What do we do in ARES? We prepare ourselves and test our equipment for emergencies. During the tornado season we provide numerous watches. The ARES Net is activated and members call in to be dispatched to predesignated watch points. The net can also be activated to provide other emergency communication services such as flood watches. In cases of localized problems such as fires. individuals close to the scene can be requested to dispatch to provide emergency communications with agencies such as the Red Cross, Preparation for actual emergencies consists of

testing our equipment and operating abilities by providing communication for functions such as Toys For Tots. The Election Commission, Bike-A-Thons, Omaha Marathon, and others, Also short training topics are discust during our Sunday evening ARES Net.

How can I join ARES? ARES meets every Sunday evening at 9:00 p.m. on the 34/94 repeater. New check-ins are always welcome and are not limited to ARES members. If you do wish to join ARES, all it takes is filling out an ARRL form 7 available from either Carl Quijas, WBØTUE or Bob Neben. K9KAW. You will receive a complete membership packet containing all necessary information to assist the Douglas/Sarpy County ARES.
