

A LOW-COST LINEAR

Tightwads awake! Need a few extra watts on Six and don't want to blow the converter funds? Well, read on. For less than \$20 you can have a rig that will deliver 150 watts output or more. And it starts like this:

The 811 tube (two of them) is the basis of this rig. The tube is cheap even if you have to buy new ones, and is plentiful in surplus. The filament transformer can be any old 6-volt centertapped iron you have that can deliver 8 amps. Everybody has 4-pin sockets and No. 12 wire. For the No. 6 used in the tank coil, buy your powerline crew a cuppa cawfee. And the tank capacitor is cut down from most anything in the junkbox. The only thing I had to buy was the chassis.

Mount the tubes, the tank capacitor, and the transformer on the chassis and most of the rig is built except for a bit of wiring.

The circuit itself is the basic grounded grid linear, which requires no tuned input tank and runs Class B without bias. This means that the input circuit reduces to two filament chokes and four .02-mf capacitors. Since the filament chokes must carry 8 amps, they'll have to be a bit large. Figuring 700 circular mils per amp, No. 12 wire works out great.

I made my chokes by winding two layers of No. 12 on 1-1/2 x 1/2 inch powered iron slugs, and they dipped out to be resonant about 35 Mc. If you can't find any slugs, 25 turns of No. 12 on a 1-1/8 inch form air-core will do. The important thing is to re-

sonate below 50 Mc., but not too far below.

Mount the chokes, wire them in, and run two of the .02-mf capacitors from the filament pins to the input connector.

Now ground the grids and the rig's input is complete if you want to do it the easy way. If you're curious about the grid's current, though, follow the schematic.

As for the final tank circuit there's not much to be said. The capacitor from the plates to the tank is a high-voltage TV bypass. The tuning capacitor itself was made from sections cut off a Johnson 50E45 variable in the junkbox. The final tank coil was wound around a form measuring 1-1/2 inches O. D., from No. 6 wire, and the No. 6 was flattened and drilled so that it would mount to the tuning capacitor and chassis. Use star type lock-washers when mounting the coil to be sure of a firm connection.

The antenna tap was determined experimentally as no bridge was available. Set the tap for best loading and modulation. And that completes the construction.

Testing is easy. Connect the driving rig and tune it for about 95 ma of grid current to the 811's. Once the loading of the driver rig is set, touchup can be done by watching the fed-through power from the linear with B+ off. Then apply B+ to the linear and dip plate current. Check for upward modulation and you're on the air.


I am using mine with a 750 vl supply and loading to 350 ma in operation; the standby current is 30 ma. This figures to be 262.5 watts DC input, and I measure 150 watts out. If you want to do the same, look through your junkbox and get started. Now is the time to build, so when the band gets hot next spring you'll be ady. Can I expect to find you on an?

It takes no genius to visualize what the latest FCC call changing policy might do to an otherwise peaceful QSL Bureau. Years ago we used to be able to accommodate cople by forwarding their cards to another sorter when they changed calls. This job has turned into a monster and we can no longer keep up with it. Therefore, we now require envelopes under each call to receive cards. This is required for several years since we do at times receive cards up to three years after the OSO. We do hold cards for at least one year and usually longer but the files would eventually cover the earth if sooner or later we didn't destroy them. Then too, if the FCC were to reissue the call which could happen, the new owner would be paying postage for cards of no value if we held them too long.


