them at all airmail radio stations between Elko, Nevada and Iowa City. These transmitters remained in service for several years until the Department of Commerce took over in 1927. The Omaha radio station was iperated by Frank Barnhill. A 2-KW Federal Arc transmitter was used; that put as much as 20 amps into the antenna and ground — mostly ground.

Since I acquired the rubbercovered wire from the deserted Ak-Sar-Ben Field, I proceeded to put it to use. It was decided to string this wire to the house of another radio classmate of mine who lived about 2 blocks from me. The house where he lived is still there at 22nd and Binney Streets. The Sacred Heart Church was just across the street. We strung the wire on the poles that went down the alley to Locust Street near 24th Street. This made a very fine method of direct communication by code. After a few months of having our private line, however, it was discovered by the power company and this wire was removed from the poles.

Another good use of this wire was when it was decided to hold a picnic in Elmwood Park by our high school class. I decided to bring along my homemade radio receiver. It was a galena crystal type detector and had the usual Quaker Oats box for the tuning coil. I still have the original headphones made by "Brandes" nd the galena crystal. The antenna was strung between two trees and a center lead line to my set. The year was 1922 and the only radio station broadcasting was WAAW, the Omaha

Grain Exchange. We also listened to the Code messages from the airmail transmitter located at Ak-Sar-Ben Field. Our location was certainly ideal, for the high ground and the short distance was not over a mile or two from the station.

I can still see the curious looks on the faces of the rest of my classmates when we picked up some voices. Qf course, there was a lot of static. The entire receiver was carried in a small suitcase. The first portable in Omaha!

QSL CORNER By Charlie, WØQQN


The bomb was finally dropped vesterday by the post office. The rate increase was announced vesterday, February 19, that the irst class rate would go from 15¢ to 18¢ for the first ounce and 17¢ for each additional ounce. A postal increase obviously puts the QSL Bureau in a turmoil. Right now we estimate we have about 20,000 envelopes in our files, mostly with 15¢ postage affixed. Since we cannot mail postage due, we must add 3¢ on each envelope we mail out after the new rate goes into effect. Since these envelopes actually belong to whom they are addressed, it becomes their responsibility to up the postage. Since it seems unreasonable to spend 18¢ to send 2 3¢ stamps to the Bureau to up your 2 envelopes on file, yet it is just as unreasonable for us to spend \$600.00 to up the envelopes. So we work it out on an individual basis. We have survived this in the past and will probably survive it in the future. Our envelopes supplied by the Bureau will go to 4 for \$1.00, thus passing the postal increase on.

QUESTION AND ANSWER EDITOR

How do I tune up my exciter/ amplifier for maximum output? With a two-tone audio oscillator and oscilliscope or spectrum analyzer into a 50 ohm dummy loa that matches the antenna load impedance.

Most all of the present day HF transmitters and amplifiers use Class B or Class AB operated tubes in the final stage, so our remarks will be confined to this type of equipment.

Connect the 'scope as a linearity tracer or the spectrum analyzer to the output of the transmitter/exciter first. Then after that has been checked out, to the amplifier output. Feed the two-tone generator into the mike input at the normal mike level of about -50DB.

WITH THE CABINET CLOSED and the power on, gradually increase the drive and increase the loading while maintaining resonance until the point which "flattopping" is indicated on the screen. That is it, maximum output, if you are very lucky! If the spectrum analyzer shows the third harmonic distortion below -30DB of the two tones. or the "tracer" shows a straight line or if you have an envelope pattern on the 'scope that has a nice short cross-over you have a textbook case that does not usually show up without some added adjustments. Here the finals bias adjustment is the kee to good linearity. Start with the bias voltage given in the instruction book or the tube manufacture's spec. This is the "average" bias for new tubes and

changes with tube aging to produce a minimum of distortion. The useful life with low distortion can be prolonged by adjusting the bias up to a point where the static plate current becomes excessive.

This is the way to test fleamarket/pull-out "bargain" tubes to find that they are generally no bargain! With the zero-biased tubes used in some linear amplifiers, that adjustment is of course not available. When you have tubes in the exciter/amplifier loaded up with an exceptable amount of distortion, you are business. No mention has been

made of a wattmeter in the line to the dummy load, as it is not very useful in tuning up for the minimum of distortion and flattopping. If you do have one in the March 1981 line that is peak-reading, it will give you your PEP output, otherwise multiply the reading by 2.45 to obtain it.
