

HEADQUARTERS STRATEGIC AIR COMMAND TOUR PROGRAM INFORMATION

Briefing Facilities: Briefing facilities are widely separated. Guests will be required to walk up and down six (6) flights of stairs and many corridors. It is, therefore, incumbent upon sponsors to point this out to potential guests so that those with physical limitations may recognize the required walking portion of the tour before they arrive at the headquarters.

Photography/Tape Recorders/Paging Devices: No cameras, tape recorders or paging devices are allowed during the tour. Should guests bring cameras, recorders, calculators or paging devices, they will be held for them until the tour is completed.

Identification: Each member of the group will be required to produce two items of identification when entering the headquarters building. It is required that, if possible, one item of identification have a photo or signature on it.

Handcarried Items: Handcarried items are subject to search by authority of Section 21, Internal Security Act of 1950, United States Code 797.

Weapons: No weapons of any kind are allowed.

Underground Command Post


A 45-minute visit to the focal point of command control in SAC during which guests receive a briefing and demonstrations of how SAC operational forces are controlled.

OUCH!

This Ham is sitting at his desk answering a letter from his Insurance Company:

"I am writing in response to your request for additional information for block No. 3 of the accident reporting form. I put 'poor planning' as the cause of my accident. You said in your letter to explain more fully, so I hope the following details will be sufficient.

"I am an amateur radio operator, and on the day of the accident I was working alone on the top section of my 80' tower. When I had completed my work. I discovered that I had, over the course of trips up the tower, brought up over 300 lbs of tools and hardware. Rather than carry the now unneeded material down by hand. I decided to lower the items down in a small barrel by using a pulley which was attached to the gin pole at the top of the tower. Securing the rope which was at ground level, I went to the top of the tower and loaded the tools and material into the barrel. Then I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly to insure a slow descent of the 300 lbs of tools. You will note in block No. 11 of the report form that I weigh only 155 lbs. Due to my surprise of being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rapid rate of speed up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40' level, I met the barrel coming down. This explains my fractured skull and broken collarbone. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley. Fortunately, by this time, I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold onto the rope in spite of my pain. At the same time however, the barrel of tools hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed 20 lbs. Refer again to my weight in block 11. As you might well imagine. I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. Again at the 40 ft level I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles and the lacerations of my legs and lower body. The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries, when I fell onto the pile of tools, and fortunately only 3 vertebrae were cracked. I am sorry to report however, that as I lay there on the tools, in pain, unable to stand, and watching the empty barrel up there 80 feet above me, I again lost presence of mind. I let go of the rope "




