# May Mystery Transmitter Hunt

This physical endurance test was engineered by Tim NØGKX. He hid the transmitter in Fairmont Park in Council Bluffs. All of the hunters are now well aware of the topography of that park, which includes, paved areas, flat grassy areas and other easily accesible areas. Features previously unknown to me and the other hunters include: gulleys, muddy spots, slippery inclines (followed by hard places to land), RF obsorbing obstacles and trees with strange root formations. I am now intimatly familiar with all these features. I also discovered what an insensitive clod I hunt with-but more about that later-back to the starting point.

Tim called the hunters to order at 3:00pm and a good signal was had by all-except the WBOWOT team who where waiting for Brian, KMOY, to arrive. ## On Line

Over 450 calls have been received by the Message Center in just over two months of operation! We are anticipating lower usage during the summer months, but plans for more and better features are still moving ahead.

One of the Message Center's features is the ability to store a file sent from your computer (Uploading) or send a file to your computer so you can store it (Downloading). Let's examine each of these two functions more closely.

#### UPLOADING:

Let's say you have a file on the disk in your disk drive that you want to send to the Message Center. This is called Uploading because you are sending the file UP to the Message Center. The first thing to do is make sure your communications software has the ability to perform XMODEM file transfer. XMODEM is a method that two computers use to send files back and forth. Read your software instruction manual on how to use the XMODEM Upload feature. Now, call the Message Center (289-4658) and log on. You will have to use your password, read the bulletins and then you will see the Main Menu. Type "U" for Upload and press RETURN. You will be told how much disk space is available in 128 byte sectors (e.g. 100 FREE SECTORS means there are 100x 128 = 128,000 bytes of storage available on the disk). The Message Center will then ask you for a file name. This is the name that you want your Upload file to be called on the Message Center's disk. It can be up to 8 letters or numbers but must start with a letter. Then, you will be asked if you want to use XMODEM transfer? Type "Y" and press ENTER. The message center will tell you that the XMODEM upload is ready. Now follow the instructions on how to use your XMODEM Upload function for the file you want to send. You can abort the Upload at any time by pressing CTRL-X. The Message Center will return you to the Main Menu. When the Upload is complete, you will be told to document the file before you log off. This means that you should leave a Comment To The SYSOP and tell him a little about the file you just Uploaded so he can tell what it is.

There is another method of Uploading that does not require you to use XMODEM. The Non-XMODEM Upload feature of the Message Center is useful if you want to leave a very long message to someone on the system or if you want

to Upload text directly from your keyboard. To use this method, follow the procedures above but simply answer "N" to the XMODEM question. You will be told that two RETURNS will terminate the Upload and then you will get a "¶" prompt. Now, just type whatever you want Uploaded directly from your keyboard just like a Comment To The SYSOP or like entering a message in the Message Subsystem. Enter your text line-by-line. When you are done, press RETURN on a blank line. This will terminate the Upload. All you have type d will be saved to the file name you entered above. This is a slow way to upload text but it can come in quite handy at times.

By the way, if you try to see the file you just uploaded by using the "F" File Listing option, you will be surprised to see that it is not there. The Message Center assigns your upload file the highest possible security level when you upload it. That is why you should tell the SYSOP what it is. The SYSOP will look at the file and reassign it a lower security level after he examines it, so if you Upload an article for HAM HUM you can be assured that level 5 is the normal level you should have if you are a ham (Being a club "Y" and press RETURN. The Message Center will tell you that XMODEM Download is ready. Now you should follow the instructions on how to use your XMODEM Download feature. To abort the Download, press CTRL-X at any time. You will be returned to the Main Menu. When the

Download is complete, you should have want will be sent exactly like you see the bulletins when you log on to the system. Some communications software packages have a "capture" feature that allows you to capture anything that prints on your screen to a file on your disk drive. You can use this feature to "Download" a file without using XMODEM. Turn your capture function on before starting the Download. Everything that you see on your screen will also go to your capture file so you have essentially downloaded the file! Don't forget to turn "capture" off after the download. Look in your software manual for anything about a capture feature for your computer.

Up and Downloading are two of the three most important functions that a system like the Message Center has to offer. Play around with them. You certainly can't hurt your computer and your won't damage the Message Center help you. If I am not there, leave me a Comment To The SYSOP before you log off and tell me what happened so I can try to make things easier to use. Next time, we will take a look at the third most important function the Message Center offers - messages themselves! See you OnLine!

# Repeater Talk

I was asked some time ago to write a note on what is or is not business communications as it applies to ham radio. Perhaps the best way is to simply state the rule and use a couple of examples.

97.3 Definition (bb): Business comunications. Any transmission or communication the purpose of which is to facilitate the business or commercial affairs of any party.
97.110 Business communications prohibited. The transmission of business communications .bt an amateur radio station is prohibited except for emergency communications. (see 97.3

97.114 (b)3 Limitations on third party traffic. (it is prohibited) Except for emergracy communications defined in this part, third party traffic consisting of business

communications on behalf of any party.

Thus, it is quite clear that one cannot use ham radio to call for reservations anywhere, make a doctor's appointment or order a pizza etc. Also, within the definition above, a call to such as 911 is a business communication since it is the normal business activity of the city services used at this number but it is also an emergency communication (or one would not call 911) and is therefore permissible. Any call to 911, the Sheriff, and ambulance service or other organization whose normal business activity is involved with the general safety of life and/or property is quite permissible. This includes calling a tow truck especially if it is to move or remove a vehicle from a road where it is a potential hazard. One should not discuss the price via the radio, however.

One can also call his wife to see if anything needs to be picked up at the store on the way home. Since the business involved is with the store and the store is not taking part in the communication, it's legal. Hams can swap equipment on the air. Since neither of them is normally in the business of buying or selling it, this is a permissible communication. Money can be discussed as well but out of consideration to those fellow

hams who find this objectionalble it might be best to do it over the phone.

The original request for this article was in connection with providing information to the National Weather Service. If the NWS calls or has an official weather watch in effect, they are in effect saying that there is a potential for damage to life and/or property (including the public trust in the sirens that may or may not be sounded based on ham information). The help ham radio gives here is well within the letter and spirit of the emergency clause and is not only permitted but desired.

It should be noted also, that business use of ham radio refers only to communications and transmissions over the air and in no way mentions the manufacture, construction, repair or sale of amateur equipment or off air services for profit, pay or other renumeration. Some time ago a couple of hams caused quite a bit of trouble because they thought building ham equipment for pay was illegal and I think one of them still believes it.

In summary, it has been said many times before and will doubtlessly be repeated many more, common sense is the watch word for grey areas. If you think it's too much like business to use the radio, then don't. Wait til you get to a phone or do it in person. Remember that by the international definition, communications via ham radio are suppose to be of such an unimportant nature that recourse to tariffed systems would not be used.


