

Sun Spots and Radio Propagation

Sunspots affect radio propagation by ionizing the layers of the ionosphere.

Large concentrations of ionization in the ionospheric layers increase its ability to bend the HF radio waves and to return the signal back to earth at huge distances from the transmitter to the receiver. You may have heard about the 11 year solar cycle experienced by the Sun. During the solar cycle, the Sun's stormy behavior builds to a maximum, and its magnetic field reverses. This means that the Sun's north and south poles switch places. Then the Sun settles back down to a minimum before another cycle begins. This 11 year activity is tracked by counting how many sunspots are counted by solar scientists. That's been done since 1755, which is classed as Solar Cycle 1. What causes this 11th cycle? It appears to be driven by alignment of the Planets. Venus, Earth, and Jupiter assert a small gravitational tug on the Sun as they orbit it. On the subject of Ionization, have you ever wondered what thos fixtures emitting a blue light mounted on the walls in some restaurants? Some are mounted in HVAC systems for homes as well as industries. Air Ionization Technology is proven to Reduce Coronavirus Surrogate by 99% Airborne and 80% on Surfaces in 10 Minutes. It Aids in Neutralizing Odors, Allergens, Bacteria, Viruses, Mold Spores, and Volatile Organic Compounds (gases emitted from certain solids or liquids. Back to radio propagation; The 11 year solar cycle also has an effect on GPS performance. Positioning errors, along with communications and power grid problems, are consequences of increased solar activity. The presence of sunspots indicates solar activity which affects the ionosphere's ability to refract radio sig-

nals back to Earth. In simplest terms, fewer sunspots means less solar activity, which leads to a heck of a lot of frustrated Hams. As mentioned above Solar Cycle 1 was documented in 1775. We are now in Cycle 25 which peaks about July 2025.

Reminder this is a joint event between AARC and the BARC club and we expect this to be a big event. Hope to see you then.

The Market to Market Relay Race. Volunteers will be needed on September 25th to help with the craziest foot race you have ever seen. The M2M is a relay race between Omaha and Lincoln. It is run mostly along trails and a few country roads. Our job is to help make sure that the teams and all their members make their way safely from the start at Ak-Sar-Ben Village to the Platte River. Once there, we hand the responsibility off to the Lincoln Amateur Radio Club, who make sure that they go the rest of the way to Lincoln. Approximately 650 teams (made up of 6 to 8 runners) start in waves 20 minutes apart, starting at 5:00 am and the last wave will start at 9:40 am. Each leg of the relay is between 2.5 and 6 miles long. Each exchange point is staffed by at least one, but preferred 2 hams along with a variety of other volunteers who manage the "baton" exchange. Exchange point volunteers have different starting and ending times throughout the day. Start times for volunteers range between 4:30 am to 8:45 am. Shift ending times are between 10:00 am and 3:00 pm. There will be a shift matrix posted soon so you can plan your time to help out. Mostly our job is to report when the first runner arrives and when the last runners of the day depart. We also help make sure that the teams are following the rules that might be a safety concern (overly large team transport vehicle, improper vehicle operation) and of course help report medical needs as well.
