#### State Track Meet - May 2021

After a pandemic necessitated hiatus in 2020, the NSAA State Track Meet was back in 2021, but with some distinct differences. Rather than a two-day fun filled extravaganza of high school track and field events featuring all four school classes, the event was expanded over four days with the morning session being a single class and the afternoon also being a single class. This allowed for a reduction in the number of people in the stadium at any given time and help maintain social distancing but did not shorten the time that amateur radio was needed to support the track event.

The first mention of needing volunteers for the state track meet appeared in the May 1983 Ham Hum, making us part of the event for at least 37 years. Amateur radio supplies the communications between the field events and the PA announcers' booth. This allows the announcers to share with the crowd how those field events are progressing, who is in the lead and then the list of finalists. Tidbits of information about going for a record height or jump are also communicated.

We also get pressed into service to when an athlete is late to check in, to call officials or coaches that need to report to a location, the occasional need for a trainer or medic around the track, water and cups are needed on the field for the athletes and in the last few years, the batteries for the PA and scoreboards. But probably the most important thing we do, is to let the two events that are not on the infield of the track (Discus and Shot Put) know that its time to stand and face the flag while high school singers perform the national anthem.

The days are long, but most volunteers opt to stay the entire day, with those particularly dedicated hams doing a two day all day. After all you get a parking pass to the closest parking you could ask for, a nifty NSAA Officials shirt to wear for the meet, and a wonderful cold sandwich with chips and an apple. (Although some years we have had surprises such as Arby's, fried chicken, and lately Valentino's Pizza) And the volunteers get a front row seat to watch the best athletes from around the state.

This year the event was a bit quieter. But while crowds were smaller, they were no less enthusiastic. Husker fans are said to travel well, but do not under-estimate the attendance from a small town in Nebraska when they have a track or field star. Each class from the smaller D class schools to the large A class schools were probably in equal attendance. The running moved along on time which doesn't always happen, but it was still four long days for all the volunteers and staff.

The highlight of the meet however had to be the portable toilets. What??? Did I read that right? Yes, you did. This year, rather than the normal port-a-johns those attending the meet were treated to luxury restroom trailers. These wonderful additions were provided by Stahla Rentals, and featured running water for flushing and for a real sink to wash your hands, air conditioning and even could provide piped in music via Bluetooth. These were a terrific addition to the event, and hopefully it will be a regular feature every year.

So, a big thanks go out to the following hams for helping the Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club continue to support one of the largest high school track and field meets in the country.

In the month of July there were expenses of \$\$1,839.04 consisting of \$42.25 for Patches, \$20.80 for Education, \$62.46 for Meeting refreshments, \$1,005.00 for Window decals and Patches, and \$708.53 for a 6M Beam antenna. The repeater account had expenses of \$19.63 for parts.

# Some historical reach backs to Morse Code or Continuous Wave (CW)

Ham Radio communications have, if you did not notice, particularities that originated during the early days for radio communication using Morse Code. Most of us have heard of the Q-Codes. A whole bunch of three letter codes that start with the letter "Q" developed for commercial radiotelegraph communication. Over time, later adopted by other radio services, especially amateur radio. Q-signals are a set of abbreviations for common information that save time and allow communication between operators who don't speak a common language. Modern ham radio uses them extensively. While Q-signals were developed for use by Morse operators, their use is common on phone, as well. You will often hear, "QRZed?" as someone asks "Who is calling me?" or "I'm getting a little QRM" from an operator receiving some interference or "Let's QSY to 146.55" as two operators change from a repeater frequency to a nearby simplex communications frequency. However, what about phrases you hear on the air such as "ROGER" or "ROGER THAT". Who is Roger? Or sometimes you'll hear a person say "Hi Hi" or 73. Those are slang words and terms that also originated during the days of telegraph or CW communications. Back to ROGER; that dates back before 1915 when the letter "R" simply meant "Received". But then the switch over from Morse Code wireless telegraphy to voice commands. Being that "R" was already in place to mean "received" pilots or aviators didn't see a need to change it. Well it became somewhat confusing to transmit a message to pilots and they responded by saying "R" it may have made sense to those who spoke like a pirate. By the way, Sunday, September 19, 2021 is International Talk like a Pirate Day. Well back to talking to pilots, and to lesson any communication errors. "R" was changed to Roger, which was at the time the phonetic alphabet R. This may also aided those Pilots from Boston trying to pronounce the letter "R". In 1957, the English phonetic alphabet changed the R to "ROMEO". But, from 1915 to 1957, the word "Roger" was deeply embedded in the minds of Pilots. And then there is "ROGER THAT", another term for confirmation, generally between truckers on their CB radios. The last one: Roger Wilco: meaning Message Received and Will Comply.

Over and Out. ?? How can you turn a communication Over but you ended all transmissions by saying Out?
