News Flash... about Quads etc.

QST... QST... Tennadyne Log Periodics and Cubex Quads companies have been acquired by K5YAC and is now headquartered in Collinsville, Oklahoma. The acquisition occurred in October 2021 and product was being shipped by mid-November. While there is no intention to modify these proven designs, many process improvements have been made over the past year to expedite deliveries. Foundry work has been moved from California to Tulsa, OK and machining operations are also performed locally, which helps to reduce lead times and minimize cost. New web sites have been live since March 2022 and while they are still a work in progress, most of the product details are published. Post-Covid supply chain has proven to be a challenge, however tremendous strides have been made to procure large quantities of critical materials with plenty on hand and more in the pipeline. Still a build-to-order operation, but now housed in a 6000 sq/ft facility with many finished sub-assemblies on the shelf, projects can be completed in a reasonable time. During the first year over 160 orders have been delivered to stations around the world, generating great reviews and positive feedback. We are proud to carry on these well-known and reputable brands.
