Field Day is Almost Here!

Field Day is ham radio's open house. Every June, more than 40,000 hams throughout North America set up temporary transmitting stations in public places to demonstrate ham radio's science, skill and service to our communities and our nation. It combines public service, emergency preparedness, community outreach, and technical skills all in a single event. Field Day has been an annual event since 1933 and remains the most popular event on ham radio.

The Ak-Sar-Ben Radio club has been participating in this event since the late 1940s. We welcome anyone who has an interest in amateur radio to stop by and we will help you to participate in this great event, or if you just want to learn more about Amateur Radio.

We start station setup on Friday June 23. We start operating on Saturday June 24 at 1 p.m. and go continuously for 24 hours.

This year's site is at the world-famous Village of Boys Town. We recommend that you use the 137th and Dodge Street exit. Go a quarter mile south into Boys Town and take the first left for another quarter of a mile. There will be AARC signs to guide you to the stations.

We will be operating two 100W HF transmitters on 80M through 10M using emergency power under the club K0USA call. Additionally, we will also have a "Get on the Air" station available for newcomers and inactive Hams. Finally, we will also be operating on 6M & 2M SSB (50.125, 144.200) FM (50.525, 146.52) and Digital (50.313, 144.174) so give us a call. Talk in on 146.94-.

Thanks to the generosity of Boys Town, we will be doing all of this with the comfort of air conditioning and with a real roof over our heads. Snacks and drinks will be provided.

All are welcome; you do not need to be a member of Askarben ARC to sign up. Don't have experience with HF? Don't worry about it; each station has two slots, one for the operator, and one for a logger. We'll get you warmed up as the logger before we put you behind the mic. All stations are capable of SSB, CW, and Digital modes. We are a bit limited in real-estate, so if you're itching to try out your new go-box or latest portable antenna, please coordinate with us in advance by emailing phconnell@cox.net.

Did You Know that Operating "Barefoot" means your radio is not hooked up to an amplifier, so usually the radio is transmitting with 100 watts or less. An amplifier typically boost the radios signal to 1000 watts (more or less)

AARC Members Recognized For Twenty Five Years Volunteering at the NSAA State Track Meet.

In 1981, Larry Bock, KCOR brought amateur radio to help provide communications to the Field Events at the NSAA Nebraska State Track and Field Championships. 43 years later, the relationship continues. Amateur Radio is primarily responsible for providing the up-to-date information to the announcers to provide information to the crowd about what is happening at various events. From leaders during the event preliminaries, to the finalists, to calling attention to the efforts of two pole vaulters as they vie for the championship.

Over the years, there have been improvements for the communicators. From the "net control" point being outside on the roof of the upper press box, to moving inside an expanded (and non-climate controlled press box) and using a mag mount antenna with feedline sent in through the door, to having a permanent antenna installed and finally being moved directly next to the announcers. This last item has created a great relationship between the two types of communicators, with reports from the field being overheard and relayed by the announcers with no need to write the message and hand it to Rich or Scott in the announcer's booth.

Hams are also part of the safety for the athletes and spectators. Calls for medical assistance are relayed over amateur radio, and we are part of the evacuation plan should there be a need to move everyone to shelter in the event of severe weather.

There have been many longtime volunteers, some have retired from spending a day at the event, others have become silent keys. Pat KØCTU and Mary NØTRK were recognized for 25 years of volunteering with the meet. (They took off a year here or there to make the trip to Hamvention, but they have been volunteering at the event since 1994)

The meet was cancelled in 2020, but came back with a new format in 2021, stretching the event to 4 days, allowing for a bit more spacing of people. The meet has run as a 4-day event. While this means a slightly shorter day for the hams, as the field events being completed for the day by early afternoon, it does mean volunteers are needed to cover four days. However, there is no need for everyone to volunteer all four days (although many do) working a day or two is possible. There is always a place for another operator.

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There will also be changes as the old press box will soon be torn down and a new more modern building will go up. This will give Burke High better concessions stand, more accessibility, and an expanded press box able to better support the technology that is becoming part of high school sports. Where amateur radio will be housed hasn't been determined yet, but Rich and Scott (the voices of the meet) still look forward to having details of each event delivered to them.

This year the crew with the ring side seats (and parking passes in the "officials" lot) were Scott KA4ZZQ, Ronnie WDØA, Ryan WØNU, Steve NØUP, Brian WEØBEP, Larry ADØLS, and Garrick KFØBLU. Pat KØCTU recruited volunteers and serves as an interface with the Nebraska Schools Activities Association as well as being the liaison at the medical tent, and Mary NØTRK served as the relay to the announcers. MEMORIES OF A PAST BOYS TOWN FIELD DAY Truthfully Told, ONLY slightly Tongue in Cheek By John Bruckner, WOHII, Life Member AK-SAR-BEN ARC June 26th, 1976:

Field Day set up at the Priests Retreat area, just East of 144th Street, North of Pacific. It was hot, muggy, buggy, mosquitoes and No-See-ums were thick. We were watching dark, ominous rotating clouds, (See photo) form West of the corn fields across 144th street... the wind getting stronger and gustier... no rain yet, I take a quick photo of the approaching storm while tightening the guy ropes on the SIX METER SHACK tent. Boys Town sirens blow. Then here it comes...heavy, heavy rain, strong wind, watching others running to their cars, others taking shelter outside around a pile of manure? We jump into the back of my pickup topper when the huge hail began, softball sized in diameter, the noise of the hail and rain is deafening, the windshield cracks, wind rocking the pickup, and watching John Draus, WOEKB (SK) punch the hail dents in the topper roof out with his fist as they appear, over and over again...finally the storm eases, then stops. Blessed silence. We leave the relative safety of the truck, coming back to our tent, now flat, the folding card table collapsed, both folding chairs are now outside the tent.... the Clubs Drake TR-6 sitting in deep water in the bottom of the tent, both power supply and radio drenched. In lifting them, water pours out... Antennas are down on the ground.... Retrieving the floating paper log sheets from the water, soaked but luckily written in pencil so still readable... all power poles (wooden ones, not the plastic DC connectors of today) and electric wires are down across 144th Street, totally blocking it...me driving back home to get MY Drake TR-6 so we could continue ... CQ FIELD DAY W0EQU!

2023 KOUSA: Inside? An actual building? With a roof? Air Conditioning? Large Space? Computers? No bugs (insects)? No smelly tents? NO TORNADO HITTING FIELD DAY (Hopefully)? Where's the FUN in that?? LOL! PS: Good luck, have fun, I'll look for KOUSA from here in Texas. 73, John WOHII/ 5
