The following is the latest report on RACES:---

The Nebr. State Civil Defense communication plan (RACES) has been approved; WØJDJ has been appointed and approved by FCC as Chief Radio Officer under the RACES plan. A CD station has also been authorized. The state is to be divided into 5 mobile support areas. plan calls for a State Net Control Station with 5 supporting control stations (one in each area). Other participation stations in these areas will (Usually) work into the area control area station. There are Three Frequencies in the 3990 to 4000 kc segment and five frequencies in the 3500 to 3510 kc segment with similar provisions in other allocated bands. It is hoped this arrangement will alleviate the situation that developed in the recent CD "Operation Wake Up". Those wishing to become RACES Stations and participate in this setup please contact F.
