W Ø George Kilowatt London calling Card No. 100 for DXCC

Possibly as you receive this paper Orville will be receiving his last card to become (to our knowledge) the first Omaha DXCC station.

At this writing GKL had just received a card from Saudi, Arabia to make 99 countries confirmed and he has eleven more countries worked but as yet cannot get a QSL card from them. Five of these eleven were worked over a year ago but that would leave six live possibilities. We often wonder how even 99 cards can be collected when such things exist as EA9DC requesting that \$1.00 be sent with each QSL card as Orville reports.

We are quite sure most everyone has heard GKL's solid signal on twenty meter phone but for those who have not seen it here's a thumb nail sketch. QTH - about three blocks of second gear driving west on Thirtieth street on Nebraska Ave. (or as your editor remembers it better - about a half a block west of Neckers Knob overlooking Miller Park). The antenna is a two element beam (Formerly a three element job until the wind removed an element last November) atop a 45 foot telephone pole. The transmitter is a home brew job sporting a 304TL final, modulated by a pair of 304TLS in AB-1.

The receiver, and Leo will love us for this, is a super buy from a World Radio auction, which Orville poured a total of \$13.00 into. This bargain was originally an ARR-7 or the Army's version of an SX-28-A. Orville removed the reradiation rejection stage and added a stage of R.F. for a total of three R. F. stages, The normal noise level at GKL's QTH is S 4 to 5. We sure wish we had a high noise level.
