NEBRASKA LICENSE PLATES

How about automobile license plates for the Nebraska "Hams". Here's the dope on the present status.

The Nebraska SCM has asked the Ak-Sar-Ben Radio Club to get the ball rolling. The bill to provide the special plates will be introduced into the 1953 State Legislature by several Senators across the state.

The bill after it is introduced will receive a number and go to a committee. This committee will meet on the bill and then hold a public hearing. The bill if successful will continue to the floor of the house for vote.

Each member of the Legislature must be contacted and sold on "Ham" radio, it's usefulness, and the purpose of the bill.

The sooner he is contacted the better, and a personal call is better than one in writing. Each of the "Hams" of Nebraska will receive a letter giving details of what we hope he will do to bring this to a successful conclusion.

Statistics show that the major job will rest with the people living in the middle and western parts of the state for it is there that 75% of the hams reside and over 80% of the state representatives live in that area.

The expenses of this job must be defrayed amoung all of us. Already the Northeast Nebraska Radio Club has voted a donation of one dollar per member.

If these plates are worth having, they are worth working for. Fellows lets get together.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 378 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS WEST HARTFORD CONN DEC 23 1952 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

FCC today finalized proposals in Dockets 10073 and 10173 with following results: Effective February 18,1953 General and Conditional Class Licenses are permitted 75 and 20 Meter voice operation. Effective February 20, 1953 voice is authorized in 7200 to 7300 kc by all amateurs except Novice and Technician, Novices are permitted CW operation in 7175 to 7200 kc, frequency shift keying including radioteletype is permitted in non voice portions of 80, 40 and 20 Meters, procedure for signing of amateur calls is made more strict. Note again these changes are not effective until February 18 and 20 respective. Details February QST, or refer June 1952 issue for essential details AR.

times called is merely Single Side Band.

No QRM and TVI because there is no carrier. Two stations on one frequency because each uses the opposite side of the frequency. By the way, there is room in the center for a CW station.

This method of transmission therefore would allow twice as many stations on each band. NO special receiver is required for SSB reception.

NOW HEAR THIS, for you non-believers and those of you just interested there will be a novel demonstration of just the above at the next meeting of the club. The demonstration will be given by Mesrs. UFD, FYP and YMU.

We might point out a very strong advantage in favor of SSB. The equivalent power output is EIGHT times the conventional AM station.
