ARRL National Parks on the Air

President Woodrow Wilson signed the Organic Act of 1916 to conserve the scenery and the natural and historic objects and the wildlife therein and to provide for the enjoyment of the same in such manner and by such means as will leave them unimpaired for the enjoyment of future generations. Which created in the Department of the Interior a service to be called the National Park Service. The first National Park, Yellowstone, is the oldest and actually founded before the National Park Service itself, in 1872 by an Act signed by President Grant. In celebration of its 100th anniversary Hams across the country will be activating from an approved list of 413 areas that not only include national parks but also monuments, battlefields, military parks, historical parks, historic sites, lakeshores, recreation areas, scenic rivers and trails, National Memorials, and the White House. AARC is going to attempt its final activation at Homestead National Monument in Beatrice, NE on the last day of this event, 31 December 2016.

ISS Contact

On Saturday, October 15, 2016, 19 local scouts were treated to a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to talk with an astronaut on the International Space Station through the Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) program. For this contact, scouts at the Mid America Council's Jubilee at Eugene T. Mahoney State Park, near Ashland, Nebraska were part of an "Astronaut Interview Team" that asked questions of Dr. Kate Rubins, KG5FYJ, in front of a crowd of nearly 6,000 attendees. The contact was completed through a telebridge connection to ARISS volunteer, Shane Lynd, VK4KHZ, in Glenden, Queensland, Australia and was moderated by Joe Spier, K6WAO.

Thanks to a great partnership between the University of Nebraska at Omaha, the Peter Kiewit Institute, NASA, NASA Nebraska Space Grant, and the Mid-America Council Jubilee, the contact was a resounding success. A support team from the Bellevue Amateur Radio Club (BARC), led by James Taylor, AJ0R, with technical and logistics support from Wayne Jorns, KE6DZD, and Dudley Allen, KD0NMD, provided coordination and on-site support for the ARISS contact. Astronaut Mike Fossum, KF5AQG, served as the emcee for the event, which also kicked off Jamboree On The Air activities for the day. What a great day for scouting and for bringing the excitement of amateur radio to today's youth!

94 Issues John, WB0CMC

Steve, NOUP and I went out to the 94 site the second week in October to do some testing. The repeater was seriously de-sensing itself most of the time. Poking around in the rack didn't turn up anything. We put a termination right on the output of the rack and all worked perfectly. Looking at the return loss of the line showed about 15 dB. Not as much as I would expect but still OK. Hooking it back up to the repeater the de-sense returned. Obviously there was something on the tower bad.

The week of Oct 17 there was a tower crew installing a line for channel 17/26 which is moving from UNO to 7. When finished with that they were to plumb and tension the tower for KETV since it wasn't straight. I was able to sneak in a bit of work for us. The tower crew took a new jumper to replace the existing one but it was too short. I found a loop of ½ inch hard line on a shelf in the building and called Warren to see if we could use that. It had the right connectors as well. He said OK. I also had the crew put a 50 ohm termination on the band splitter and measured the return loss at 35 dB across 100-160 MHz. Nothing wrong here. With the new jumper terminated, no noticeable change, still –35 dB. Good here, too. We hooked it to the new antenna and I could see nearly no change in the return loss. I could tell when it made contact with the connector but no more. Bad antenna. I called Dave and he got the antenna trailer and we loaded the old antenna up and took it to my basement/back yard. We fixed it with some re-manufacturing. The noise in it was caused by a broken lightning stub. It was rubbing on the top brass cap. It was fairly easy to disassemble and fix. Dave took the top section home and drilled and tapped it for a new piece. I went to Ace hardware and got some brass screws and nuts to fix it and replaced the UHF connector with an N female. The rest of the "guts" were in really good condition so it should give good service for years to come if need be. We reassembled it, caulked it back up with some good RTV goop and took it back out to KETV. This was Wednesday, the 19th.

I took the connector off the old jumper and it had a nice green copper coat on the shield. It was obvious where the de-sense came from. I cut the few inches off the end for show and tell at the next meeting. After a bit I noticed a puddle on the floor under the cut end of the cable. It still had water in it. See pic.



. It is a bit out of focus but the patina is quite obvious. Green copper doesn't conduct too well. This was the main source of the noise that developed after the new antenna was installed. There was still water in the old jumper since I saw a puddle on my basement floor after I cut this piece off. There is a new jumper up there now thanks to KETVs donating it.

Once there I asked the tower crew if they could swap antennas while they were still here. He said "be here at 8 tomorrow morning". I was. They swapped it out around 9 AM and I took some more readings on the line. The return loss went from -8.2dB to -37 dB at about 143 MHz. and about -25 dB at 94. It is still a good antenna. That's what is up there now since Thursday morning (20th). I also looked at return loss from 100-500 MHz. The 440 antenna looks really good

I talked to Telwave and got a RA#. Dave took the new antenna out to Steve's work where he will ship it back to CA under warrantee. There is a possibility the failure was due to lightning since Warren had to fix some damage to some of his tower strobes too. We'll see.

94 is working really well now. The old antenna is in good shape after the fix. It's working so well that the Swig-net ran over an hour and a half with the only noise being a distant station with not enough power.

Don't forget to ID if you kerchunk it to see if it's working. It's the legal thing to do (required).
