Received a nice letter from Ed Handy, W1BDI, Communications Manager of ARRL. Our story regarding the origin of the word "Ham" as lifted from another ham paper it seems is not to be found in the history books of Ham Radio. He enclosed a copy of a letter from Mr. Budlong to another club regarding this same story. These stories do get around. May be we can slow this one up by quoting Budlong's letter.

"Dear OM:

I was much interested in noting the item in your club bulletin "Mike & Key" June'57, recently on the explanation of the word "ham,"

We're quite familiar with this matter from our experience with it several years ago and it occurs to me you might be interested in what we found when we looked into it.

We originally came upon it when some doctor in New York-not an amateur himself, so far as I could see--sent in the clipping from a medical journal. He wanted to know if we confirmed the story. We had to say that we'd never heard of it before and that offhand it sounded a little incredible that after all these years of speculation on the origin of the word no one.

had ever come up with this story.

We checked the Senate Committee hearing record of the 1912 bill and found no mention of the incidents mentioned or the people.

Senator Walsh wasn't a senator in 1911. According to the "Biographical Dictionary of the American Congress," he wasn't elected to the Senate in 1919. He was governor of Massachusetts in 1914-15, and lieutenant governor in 1913; so far as his activities in 1911 are concerned, we can find nothing to indicate that he wasn't anything other than a private practicing lawyer.

You will recall the recent series of articles on early radio by Sumner Young, WQCO. He was originally one of the pioneers in the Boston area. We wrote him about it and he'd never heard anything of the people or the station.

Some time later we had a letter from Dr. Hyman's secretary who wanted to know if we'd like a story. We said we would, but that it should be well documented. We never had a reply.

Just thought you might be interested.

# NO WATTS TO SPARE?

The ten meter activity has picked up quite a bit now that propogation is better. Activity on the up-swing for local activity as well as all state side and DX. One afternoon's operation netted your editor 4 continents with no strain. In fact I called CO (not even CO DX) and each time got DX in reply. You fellows that don't have many watts to spare in the antenna should give this band some attention if you have not operated it. A good 50 watts in a good 3 element beam will put you on a par with nearly anyone. On ten its more the antenna than the power. On ten there are more mobiles with DXCC that there are KW's with the same award on 20.

The power run; 31% between 75 watts, 28% use 35-75% watt. 20% are in the L50 to the 500 watt class, with a small 12% using under 35 watts, and the big ones 500 watts and above are in a 9% class.

40 Meters are worked by out 67%, 80 meters by 60%, 10 meters comes 54%, 20 Meters for another 48% with 33% for both 6 and 2 meters.

# "CRYOTRON"

A new device, called the "Cryotron", which shows possibilities of surpassing the the vacuum tube or transistor, has been invented by Arthur D. Little of M.I.T. The cryotron is of standard size 0.2-0.3-0.6 inches. It is made from 0.003 Niobium wire, wound over insulated 0.009 Tantalum gate.

Because of the phenomenon of superconductivity at low temperature, near absolute zero (minus 459.69), many metals and alloys suddenly lose all their electric resistance. If a current is started to flow in one of the super cooled superconductors, it will continue to flow even though the source is disconnected. If the superconductor of this type is exposed to a magnetic field the resistance is restored, thus stopping the current flow.

A computor capable of multiplying ten figures could set on a desk top, using the cryotron as a memory unit. It is experimental yet, but bound to be practical in time.
