Also discussed was the possibility of setting up special interest groups, such as a SIG for repairing equipment—parts sources, troubleshooting techniques, test equipment, etc. This segued into kit building, helping people if they have problems with kits or repairs, helping new hams, and techniques to get them on the air.

Nothing definite was settled upon, but this is still in the early stages. Look for updates in future meetings after the survey results have been studied and more feedback comes in. As he concluded the meeting, Adam KDØMMG stated that if you have any ideas, be sure to contact him.


Saturday Night Coffee

Our program for May will be on Digital Communications by our Past President Tomas, NW7US. He will show us how to get started with digital.

On May 7 through May 13 you will be able to work the ARRL's W1AW/Ø operating from selected stations in Nebraska. The bands are usually 20 meters and 40 meters and sometimes 75 meters. You can check

http://dxsummit.fi/ to see if they are on the air and on which frequency. Or just cruise the bands and look for them. W1AW/7 will be operating from Utah as well during those days. If you contact these stations, you can sign up on http://www.arrl.org/ to automatically get QSL cards from any W1AW portable station you contact during this ARRL Centennial year through the QSL Bureau. Normally you can not get any US ham QSL cards through the Bureau, only DX QSL cards. The ARRL is making an exception for just this year. You do have to be signed up with the WØ QSL Bureau to get cards though.

You do have envelopes and stamps on file at the WØ Bureau don't you? If you have any QSO's with a DX (Foreign ham station) on High Frequency or 6 meters, the foreign ham will often send a QSL card to you through the bureau system. If you do not have envelopes and stamps on file at the bureau the cards for you will be thrown away!

It's easy to get signed up at the WØ Bureau. Check out http://zeroburo.org/, print out the order supplies PDF, mail that form with a check for \$6.00, and they will set aside six envelopes with forever stamps on them for you, and 8 extra-ounce stamps (\$.21) if you have a heavy envelope with a lot of cards. They will save your QSL cards and send them to you once a quarter. Last quarter, I received an envelope in the mail with 18 QSL cards from all over the world. It's kind of like Christmas for hams when an envelope comes in the mail! The "buro", as it is called by hams on CW, for our area handles up to 15,000 cards per quarter—all done by volunteer hams in Missouri.

You can send cards back to the DX stations by using the Outgoing QSL Bureau run by the ARRL. You fill out a bunch of cards you want to send to DX stations, put them in an envelope and send them to the Outgoing Bureau. They will send your cards for free to bureaus in foreign countries which will send them to the appropriate ham. See the details on the ARRL site. It beats mailing individual QSL cards to different countries, which can cost \$1.50 or so in postage for each card in an envelope. The downside is that it can take months to get a card you want through the "buro" system.

March Haiti Trip

[Editor's Note: This is the latest update on John's multi-year project to help upgrade the TV and FM stations belonging to Pastor Revenel Benoit's Lutheran Church in Gonaïves, Haiti. We left Omaha a bit after 6AM on the 26th. The "we" is myself and Joe Francis, who is a professional tower climber. The trip to the Miami International Airport through Dallas was uneventful and on time. On board the flight to Port-au-Prince the captain informed us that one of the GPS systems was in-op and a tech was coming to fix it. It wasn't fixable so they put us on another plane at the other end of the terminal. We finally got off about four hours late and into port around 8:30 instead of the scheduled 4:20. Our driver was patiently waiting for us; and at that time of night the trip to Gonaïves only took a bit over two hours—most likely a record.

The next morning we went over to the church to go through the things I had sent in my last shipment. Some we took to the mountain, the rest stayed at the church.



Once on the mountain Joe got right to it and changed out one of the jumpers on the antenna that we knew was damaged. Then he started to seal up all the connectors and joints on it. After that was done, it was time to test the antenna. The new transmitter didn't

like it so we put the old one on and it showed a serious problem with reflected power. Joe felt one of the two lines going to the antenna and it was hot. He broke the line open and a couple of quarts of water ran out. The second line was nearly as bad. What had happened was that last February (2013) there wasn't enough time to seal up all the connectors and the sealant wasn't much good anyway. Rain had seeped in. We reconnected the lines and retested. It was now a really good antenna. Joe broke the lines apart again to let them dry out as much as possible overnight.

On Friday, Joe had a few minor adjustments to make to a couple of the elements and seal them up. We also broke open the connections outside the building to get more air through and dry out as much as possible.

This antenna is actually two on one mast. One is an east-west array and the other a north-south, giving an omni-directional pattern; hence, the two lines. Everything got reconnected before we left that evening. We put the new transmitter back on and it ran really well the rest of the evening. There is a mini-studio on the mountain with a couple of VCRs and DVD players. The microwave link from the church still wasn't working.

Saturday, we were not able

to get to the mountain due to vehicle problems. On Sunday, Joe started to paint the tower with a white primer coat. He also changed the bulb in the top beacon.

He only got the top 2/3 done before he got rained off. Being on a tower during a rain event, no matter how slight is not smart or safe—and besides, the paint won't stick.

The antenna is now in really good shape and should last for years. The painting needs to be finished but there is a guy that Joe has trained to safely climb towers who is also a painter and can finish the job. The bottom third needs the white primer put on and there are four gallons of aviation orange for the final coat.

On Tuesday we prepped the new microwave for the studio-to-transmitter link and installed it. There is still not enough of a signal up to the mountain to be useful. It is probably a section of waveguide that isn't in too good a shape—or the path or dish aiming has gotten off a bit. There wasn't time to do anything about that. It will have to wait for another trip.

When we got to the mountain we discovered that most of the tools had been stolen. There was only one guy with the key and responsibility for the site. Revenel went to his house to ask about it and found a speaker and DVD player that were also missing. He went through the legal process for Haiti and the guy will have about two weeks to return everything or go to jail. We had an air tight case. I'm going to try and find a good set of tools to replace what was

stolen and ship it with all the DVC Pro VCRs and other equipment in my basement that I've gotten from WOWT and KMTV.

I'm also looking for a good hammer drill with a 3/8 or $\frac{1}{2}$ inch chuck, a claw hammer, $\frac{3}{4}$ inch conduit bender. and a 12 inch crescent wrench, all of which were missing.

On a lighter note, Joe took some video with his cell phone and it's viewable on Facebook under Joe Francis. It's pretty good stuff. The thumbnail there shows him at the top by the beacon as you can see in the top picture on page 8.


On Wednesday morning (2nd) we left for the airport in Port. Revenel had just put in a rebuilt engine in the vehicle three weeks prior. Tires good, water jugs in back, should be a good trip, eh. Just out of Pont Sondie steam started coming out from under the hood. We stopped to top off the radiator. After pouring I n about ten gallons it became rather obvious that the "new" engine had blown a head gasket and wasn't going to make it to Port, another 60 Miles or so.

Revenel flagged down a UN vehicle that was going to Port but they weren't allowed to take riders. He did flag an SUV who said he would

take us to the airport for \$50 US. His vehicle had problems too but after a couple of stops to tinker he got it going and the rest of the trip was OK. We got there about 20 minutes prior to departure but the airline wouldn't book us. They did put us on a later



Once in Miami we tried to re-book and in talking to the agent told him about the blown gasket and he gave us a voucher for a hotel room for \$89. In bed around 1030 and up again at 330 for a 6AM flight, we didn't get much sleep.

We had about a three hour lay-over in Dallas. We got lunch and sat in the gate area chatting and Joe playing with his iPhone. Joe mentioned his next vacation might be to Seattle and we talked about that for a bit. Somehow the subject of geoducks came up. A clam native to Puget Sound and vicinity—Joe was fascinated by them and spent much of the wait using Wi-Fi and learning about them. They are a rally strange creature. Google *geoduck*

(pronounced "gooey duck") and be amazed while chuckling at the same time. It was an interesting way to kill an hour or two.

We're back safe and sound. It took me a couple of days to rest up from the long trip back. I'll be going again after the next shipment of equipment gets there.

Finally, the poles for the power line are installed and the wires should be within the next few weeks or so. We hope to have city power the next time I go down.
