Dayton and Friedrichshafen



AARC members were treated to a double feature for the July meeting. Long-time member Joe Eisenberg, KØNEB, shared with us his experiences at both the Dayton Hamvention in Ohio and the International Exhibition for Radio Amateurs in Friedrichshafen, Germany.

Everybody who's been a ham for any length of time is familiar with Dayton-and several AARC members have made at least one pilgrimage to the Hara Arena. Very few, however, get to go to the German convention. Joe, being a Hamvention

representative and an official photographer, got to attend both. He brought back with him plenty of photos of the event, including two music videos.

Joe first talked about Dayton, which took place May 16 through 18. He gave a brief history of the event and how it grew to be the largest in the world—with the events in Tokyo and Germany coming in second and third, respectively. He described the overall size of Dayton; number of booths and stalls (both inside and outside), and how it took four hundred volunteers to make everything work.

He gave tips on how to drive or fly to Dayton and how to make best use of your time while there. This included buying tickets in advance, bringing heavy tote bags (the ones at Hara usually aren't sturdy enough for everything you'll buy), and options for shipping your purchases home. He recommended that you wear comfortable shoes and to bring plenty of cash for the flea markets—they might not take credit cards.

A month after Dayton, Joe flew to southern Germany to the Friedrichshafen event, which was held on June 27 through the 29th. Someone in the audience asked him why they held the event during Field Day. He jokingly (?) replied that nobody else in the world could get on the air, anyway.

With him went AARC member Brian Zdan, WM0Y, who is fluent in German. Throughout the presentation, Joe would check with Brian to make sure he got his facts straight.

In many ways. the German convention is similar to Dayton: quite large, many stalls with lots of things to buy, and international in scope—to name three. Other activities were unique. Booths that represented a particular country's equivalent of the ARRL would hand out free food and drink common to their country—including alcohol. One had to be careful and pace onself when wondering around the arena.

Joe talked about some of the sights to see in the Friedrichshafen area, plus gave some tips on how to prepare for the trip. The latter included how to get a permit to operate over there. Also, he recommended that if you bring a power strip with an adapter for German AC plugs, make sure the strip isn't surge protected. It might catastrophically fail.

Joe concluded his talk with two entertaining music videos/slide shows that he'd created: Dayton was played to "Sharp Dressed Man", while Friedrichshafen was set to "Der Kommissar." 

How to blast a robo-caller. When you answer, after the original recorded message, it will tell you how to talk to a real person. Press 1 on the touch-tone, usually. When the real person answers, press the button on the blaster.

When you press the button, it disconnects your phone and sends a tone at about +8dBm down the line.

Most likely the real person on the other end will have earphones on so he can use both hands on a keyboard. He will get the full level of the tone in his ear or ears. Somewhat painful under the circumstances and he can't pull off the earphone as fast as a hand set.

You should be able to hear the tone faintly from the inductor. It will change tone slightly as the robo person disconnects. You can let off on the button at this point and hang up smiling.

No parts are critical. The inductor can be larger. A 600 ohm transformer winding would be ideal. You just don't need the other winding. Radio Shack has them as do all the electronic supply houses. The DC resistance of the winding is what holds the line while the button is pressed.

It has been almost two weeks now since the last blast and no more calls. It might be having an effect. One can only hope.

After two or three test transmissions, Adam was still reassembling his antenna and Bill was adjusting pull-out TV rabbit ears (what else?) to hear the signal. Dave and Pat left while further attempts by Adam and Bill resulted in Adam finally briefly hearing the signal at about 3:10, so they left with me following them.

We proceeded east on Underwood avenue to 46th street where Adam took another reading unsuccessfully. While we were parked there Pat Connell, NØBNY stopped and asked what we were doing. Bill told him about the transmitter hunt and Pat related that he had hunted transmitters 25 or 30 years ago with the club and wished everyone good luck.

From there Adam and Bill headed east on Cumming Street and I got two stoplights behind and lost them. I headed northwest to an area that I thought John had mentioned in a conversation earlier in the week.

At about 4 PM Adam was advised to go to the last place he heard the transmitter, so he proceeded back to Memorial Park He was also advised to "think Bunnies." At this point I circled Benson High School (home of the Benson Bunnies) with no sightings of anyone related to the hunt.

At 4:20 PM Adam again heard the transmitter from the starting point and proceeded north to Benson Park and found the transmitter at about 4:40 PM. At this point while I was parked in Gallagher Park in Benson when I got a call to head to the west side of the pond (whoops, wrong park). Bill slowly worked his way to the transmitter and found it at about 4 PM.

The hungry hunters retired to Arby's for reviving nourishment.

Lessons learned: Use and check out your equipment before you go hunting. Don't be surprised if the signal is not in the direction that you sight along the boom. If you can't hear the transmitter go to the last place you heard it. Tape measure beams don't work well in the wind.

The next transmitter hunt will probably be August 10 at 3 PM.

QCWA 2014 RARE COUNTY SPECIAL EVENT

Chapter 25 of the Quarter Century Wireless Association is pleased to announce the 2014 Nebraska Rare County Activation special event. It is designed to encourage amateurs both in and out of Nebraska to activate those Nebraska counties which are considered difficult to contact. The event is aimed at making the rarer Nebraskan counties available to county hunters: for example, those earning county hunter awards and/or interested in earning a Worked All Nebraska County award.

The activity will take place entirely on Saturday, October 11th. It will start at 8:00 AM CDT (1300Z) and end at 5:00 PM CDT (2200Z). The special event station, NEØQP, will be operating from some of the counties during this period.

A preliminary list of rare counties includes the following: Boyd, Knox, Garfield, Johnson, Loup, Rock, and Sioux. also, there will be an effort to activate Washington, Burt, Cumming, Johnson, Pawnee, Boone, Holt, Perkins, Chase, and Grant counties.

The general frequencies to be used in the special event are located near the County Hunter's Net frequencies:

CW: 7,056.5 14,056.5 21,056.5 kHz SSB: 7,188 14.336 21,336 kHz

Possibly not all rare counties will be activated, and some at different times. Therefore, about two weeks prior to the activity we will post a Schedule of Operations with more details (call, county, time, band). Check the QRZ website (http://qrz.com/) for NEØQP (the QCWA Ch. 25 call sign).

Interested individuals and clubs are encouraged to contact Reynolds Davis, KØGND (email: ReynoldsD1@aol.com) so that we may post tentative operations schedules. Stations needing a specific county are also encouraged to contact KØGND; we will endeavor to activate that county if it is not already scheduled.
