



Single Sideband PART 3

Now that we have decided to go SSB, the only remaining question is How? Actually, it isn't as hard as it might appear. Remember, we are going to generate an A.M. signal, then eliminate the carrier and one sideband. First let's consider how the carrier is rejected.


notch filter: One The method of suppressing the carrier is to generate an A.M. signal, then put a very sharp filter, is tuned to the carrier frequency, into the circuit. This will filter, or notch, out the carrier, while leaving the sidebands intact. One type of filter to use here is a crystal filter. However, since a fairly complex filter is needed to obtain the required degree of selectivity, about 500-600 cycles, and since a simple filter that is sharply notched leaves the signal guiding "tinny", crystal alters in this application haven't found much acceptance. The other filter is the Teenotch filter, as used in some

receivers, namely the HQ-170, HC-10, SX-100 and SX-101. This filter will put a notch that is 50db deep and only about 600 cycles wide into the passband, thus notching out the carrier, and restricting the modulated frequencies below 300 cps. Thus we will get both carrier suppression and audio range restriction from this device. The high side speech restriction is handled by the sideband filter, which will be explained later. The Tee-notch is a good method of suppressing the carrier, but since the design formulae for it are rather complex, it has not been used to a great extent in homebuilt SSB equipment. However, the Hallicraters HT-32 exciter uses a Tee-notch filter in this application.

The balanced modulator: Since we have to generate an A.M. signal before we can alter it to get SSB, we can use an A. M. modulator. If two A. M. modulators, or mixers, are so connected that the carrier signals are equal in amplitude and opposite in polarity at any instant, the carriers will balance themselves out, while leaving the sidebands. This arrangement is known as a balanced modulator. It can use tubestriodes, pentodes, tetrodes, or pentagrid converters — or it can use diodes, either of the vacuum or germanium type.

Following is an explanation of one type of balanced modulator. All balanced modulators work on the same general principles. Refer to the diagram. together. The effect in the plate tuned circuit is that the signals from the two tubes will cancel each other, because the magnetic field in the half of the coil that connects to V₁ will opposite to the magnetic field in the half of the coil that connects to V₂. Therefore, if the carrier signal alone is applied to the balanced modulator, there will be no output signal

Consider now what would happen if the modulating frequency alone was applied to the



A carrier frequency designated F(c) is generated and fed to the grids of the tubes in parallel, through (1. The two triodes are perfectly balanced, and in the absence of any modulating signal, f(m) the balanced modulator would act as follows: The carrier signal drives the two grids in parallel. If both grids go positive at the same time, the seperate plate currents of the two tubes will increase

stage in the approved push-pull manner. We should have a faithful reproduction of the input signal in the plate circuit, but we don't. The reason is that the plate tank is tuned to a radio frequency, while the modulating signal is an audio frequency. Thus the tank sents no load to the Booksia signal and the pulses of audio merely go to the Bo supply, without causing any signal to

appear at the terminals of the output link coil. But there is an entirely different set of conditions when both the carrier ignal and the modulating signal are applied to the balanced modulator at the same time. The carrier still feeds both grids in parallel, but the modulation, fed in push-pull, causes one of the grids to swing less positive than the other.

The difference in grid voltages is equal to the instantaneous peak voltage of the modulating signal. Since the grids are no longer at the same potential, the current in the two tubes won't be equal, and the stage is no longer balanced. Now there will be an output signal from the balanced modulator. But it was shown that the balanced modulator causes no carrier to appear at its output, and it causes no modulating

signal to appear at its output. What then, is the output signal? The output signal is the two sidebands, minus carrier. The power consuming and unnecessary carrier has just been eliminated. The diagram shown is intended for explanation only. If more information on balanced modulators is desired, refer to any of the standard handbooks. There are many variations of the balanced modulator, but all versions depend on the use of non-linear devices, and both tubes and germanium diodes satisfy this condition. Theoretically the carrier can be balanced out completely, but in practice this is impossible. 30-40 db. carrier However, suppression can be obtained. Having just read the article describing the recent Field Day fiasco as a howling success, I feel that some comment is called for.

Had this undertaking gone under the title of, "The Ak-Sar-Ben Radio Club Annual Ham Fest, Beer Bust and Overnight Camp-out," then there would have been no question concerning the success of the venture. However, assuming that it was supposed to have been a FIELD DAY, the results can be only described as a dismal, desolate and complete failure. That a club as richly endowed with superb equipment, camping gear and choice locations as ours is should come up with so laughable a score is utterly unthinkable

From all, I have been able to read in UST, I am led to believe that Field Day is an exercise designed to promote razor sharp operation under emergency conditions and is not primarily designed to provide clubs with an excuse for an annual outing. From what I observed during my 30 hours on the FD site, no more than a mere handful had any inclination to do any serious operating, and/ or any real hope of turning in a score that the club as a whole could be proud to claim. A good successful FD is a lot of hard work, and the fun comes from 12

the after glow of pride in a job well done. Anyone who thinks that the club can be proud of that measly 200 or 300 contains been misinformed. You don't have to be grim to be efficient and the last thing I would advocate is making a chore out of Field Day. However. regardless of how fine the equipment, the camp site and the conditions, without the centive of a good competitive spirit, there is little hope that next year will produce any better results than were had this time. It's not a question of, "Can we do it?" but a question of, "Do we really want to do it?"

Radiation of harmonics by amateurs in violation of FCC rules inues to require attention.

To avoid violations, FCC urges newer amateurs especially to make sure their transmitters are tuned to the desired output

frequency and not to any harmonic. All amateurs should also have others nearby check their signals for harmonics and send work to any heard in the 11. 5.4. 7.4 Mc or other frequency ranges. Corrective measures should be taken where necessary. The Handbook and several OST articles bear on the subiect. Consult the December OST Index for these.
