Data Encryption



A concern of everyone living in the 21st century is data security. Nowadays, it's possible to store the personal information of a multitude of people onto a single DVD-information that would have filled thousands of filing cabinets can be downloaded in minutes if the system containing that data is compromised. Encrypting that data, both on the storage device and during transmission, goes a long way towards protecting it. So much so that it's usually easier for a criminal to use social engineering to access the information.

For the July meeting, Adam KDØMMG, a software developer who's worked with networks

and has extensively studied encryption systems, gave a talk on the technology behind data encryption and its history.

He pointed out that various forms of encryption go back thousands of years and was primarily developed and used for warfare communications. He gave several examples, such as the scytale cylinder used by the Greeks in the third century BC and the Caesar cipher used in ancient Rome. He stated that these and others were forms of substitution ciphers and could be cracked through letter frequency analysis—something that was discovered as early as 800 AD. He described the ways that were developed to improve the security and the counter-techniques that were created to break the improved algorithms. This included variable key lengths, one-time pads, how the German's Enigma machine was broken in World War II, and modern day techniques using symmetric keys and public keys.

Taking a dose of my own medicine

Last week, I wrote a blog post on preventive maintenance for one of my writing clients.

Afterwards, I decided to take a dose of my own medicine and do a little preventive maintenance around the shack. I started with the Astron RS-35M, which provides the DC power that runs HF transceiver and my VHF/UHF transceiver in my shack. I had started noticing a few little things, such as the voltage adjustment being a little fussy, that I wanted to correct before the supply failed on me.

After removing the cover, I vacuumed all the dust out of the supply. The RS-35M wasn't very dirty, but even so, getting the dirt out of a piece of equipment is probably the first thing you'll want to do when performing preventive maintenance. Dirt impedes air flow. That can lead to higher operating temperatures, and as the lab manager that I interviewed for my blog post said, "Heat kills."

Not only should you vacuum any dust out of a cabinet, you should also clean the fan filters, if your gear has them. Dusty filters prevent air from flowing smoothly through equipment, and that means the fans don't cool as well as they should.

Once that was done, I did a visual inspection. One thing that you want to look for are components that look like they're getting too hot. Another thing to look for is evidence of arcing. Whatever is causing the overheating or arcing will eventually cause a unit to fail. Fortunately, I found neither.

Next, I checked to see that the components mounted to the enclosure were securely screwed down. In the RS-35M, the transformer, the bridge rectifier, and an electrolytic are mounted to the enclosure. Oddly enough, the bridge rectifier was quite loose, so I tightened it down. Also loose were the output terminals. I tightened these down as well.

Finally, I squirted a little cleaner and lube into the voltage adjustment pot and worked it back and forth. That seemed to do the job. That pot now works smoothly and cleanly.

I put the cover back on, reconnected the power cable, and got back to making QSOs. It should be good for another couple of years.



Update from USS Hazard

[In 2012, Peter Daliere, KE7RDM gave a talk at the November AARC meeting about restoring the radio room on the USS Hazard at Freedom Park (see the Dec. 2012 Ham Hum, pg 11). Shortly afterwards, the Club contributed \$1500 towards the purchase of a TBS-7 radio for the project (Jan. 2013 Hum, pg. 3). In the February issue, KE7RDM wrote a status report of the project (pg 7). Following is his second status report, sent to the Club in early July.]

Ahoy Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club! It has been a while since I last wrote and I sincerely apologize for that! It has been crazy dealing with the mayoral change and new policies, procedures, and uncertainty. That said, now that the election is over and the Parks Director has been appointed, we are hoping to begin to move forward again! We are still waiting on electricity, though we hope that is coming soon.

The code room is looking good, all the wood has been stripped, the walls scraped and fixed, and the whole thing is ready to be painted. The radio room restoration in entirety has begun! The walls have been scraped, the TBL transmitter secured and wrapped (so as to keep it safe,) and the other equipment carefully labeled and removed. Wall scraping has begun though given the overhead wires, the room is far more difficult to move quickly on when compared to the code room.

Next, the desks will come out. We will be scraping the desks, fitting new wood as well as new dark green laminate to the desk tops. When the desks are removed, the whole room will be repainted with navy pale green and the deck will be painted red. Then re-assembly. The re-assembly process will be done much more slowly, to ensure 100% accuracy and safety! We do hope to return much of the radio room to full operation.

The RAK receiver will need to be fitted with new capacitors though the tubes have been collected. New antennas will need to be fitted as well. The TBS radio that this club so generously donated is safe and secure, stored at the 24th Street Parks Department Office. It is a beautiful piece of artwork I look forward to sharing with all of you, and I hope some will be willing to lend help when it comes time to install.

Satellite Communications

Adam KDØMMG's talk (see page 1) was briefly interrupted when Pat KØCTU announced that OSCAR satellite SO-50 was about to go overhead and he was going outside to try to contact it. Everybody (including MMG) crowded outside to watch the event.

Using a Kenwood TH-D7A dual-band radio, Pat aimed his hand-held Arrow II Satellite Antenna in the general direction of the bird, while Claudia K1AUD used her Android to help pinpoint and track its location. He was able to pick up KBØRZD

(EM29), KF5WGB (EM79), and a successful contact with K8YSE (EN91).* Pat mentioned that this is the second time he's done this.

The SO-50 (Saudi OSCAR 50) was launched in 2002 and carries a number of experiments including a J FM amateur repeater operating on 145.850 MHz (uplink) and 436.800 MHz downlink. Hams can access it for on-demand activation by using a 67.0 Hertz PL tone on the uplink. It also has a 10-minute timer that must be armed before use. Transmit a two-second carrier with a 74.4 Hz PL tone to arm the timer.



Adam said that public key cryptography is a system where the computer generates a public key and a private key that are mathematically related. The owner of the keys publishes the public key for all to see, but keeps the private key secret. When someone sends a message using the public key, no one can decrypt it but the possessor of the private key. This system is inherently more secure than a system using a symmetric key, which is used for both encryption and decryption. Nevertheless, symmetric key cryptography is still highly secure and faster when it comes to encoding and decoding data—something that's necessary when decoding movies on DVDs, for example.

Adam provided examples of both public and symmetric key systems: The original DES (Data Encryption Standard) is a symmetric system that was developed in the 1970s but can now be broken in under two hours. (However, a variant called Triple DES is still secure and is used by Microsoft.) Another symmetric system is the Advanced Encryption Standard (AES), which is used in Blu-ray systems and is an option on most wireless routers. Public key systems include RSA (after their inventors, Rivest, Shamir, and Adleman), SSL (Secure Socket Layer—designed by Netscape and used for browser security), and PGP. (Pretty Good Privacy—designed by Phil Zimmerman in 1991 and originally used for encrypting text, email, and files.)

Adam concluded by briefly describing related topics such as web site certificates, DNS poisoning, public key management, and cryptographic hashes.

During the Q&A session that followed, the subject tied back into ham radio with a general discussion of RM-11699, a petition before the FCC permitting encryption of data on the ham bands during an emergency. Some people (including the ARRL) are against it, others (including Adam) are in favor, and others have mixed feelings. The latter concerned HIPAA rules and whether or not the hams operating on site were considered to be part of the hospital staff.

In summary, Adam's talk was very interesting and educational. He covered a lot more than what was summarized in this article and provided a clear overview of the subject.
