December Door Prizes

December finally arrived and everybody was anxiously wondering what kind of door prizes there would be. After all, money collected from previous drawings during the past year had accumulated towards the purchase of a Grand Prize, plus a larger-than-usual number of other prizes. In

addition, all the raffle tickets that were submitted during 2012 were thrown back into the pot, thus improving the chances of members who'd participated at previous meetings.

This year, the prizes included: *The ARRL Handbook 2013, ARRL's Small Antennas for Small Spaces, Get on the Air with HF Digital, Emergency Power for Radio Communications,* four copies of the *2013 ARRL Amateur Radio Calendar,* two Arrow OSJ-146/440 dual-band J-Pole antennas, and a Kenwood TM-281A 2-meter transceiver with an Astron power supply.

Club Meeting Minutes - December 14, 2012

The meeting was called to order at 7:19 PM by saying the Pledge of Allegiance. There were 37 attendees. Introductions by name and call.

In addition, Mary received word that a missing transmitter, a new-in-the-crate TBS6 had been located and a \$2000 price was negotiated. Subsequently another museum ship had heard of the radio and made a competing bit for it. The seller agreed to sell it to the Hazard provided the sale could be completed in 2 weeks. Peter reported that he had already raised \$500.

Mary exchanged e-mails with the board members and the consensus was to make a donation to the Hazard to purchase the radio.

Mary called a special meeting of the board of Aksarben ARC on December 5, 2012 and at that meeting the board voted unanimously to donate \$1500 for the purchase of the radio. The donation would go to the City of Omaha and they would handle the purchase. In addition a fund raising drive would be initiated to recover the club's funds and to use the proceeds from the sale of excess club equipment for that also.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - Marv, AEØEG - Marv reported that there were no deposits in November and payments of \$106.36 during the month for *Ham Hum* bringing the balance in all of the accounts to \$23,002.97.



Tales of Anton Reeh

The Only Picture

[Editor's Note: Here, in an exciting story of high adventure (and low humor), another mystery of Mr. Reeh's life is brought to light by his biographer, WA9ASD. (Anton holds many call signs from his world travels and contributes door prizes to the monthly AARC meetings.)]

In the early 1990s Anton Reeh, UN1QUE, had occasion to hire a private cruise vessel to explore the Marshall Islands in the Pacific for a secret purpose. Throughout the remainder of his life he never revealed the reason for this trip and none of his staff were ever able to determine the reason(s). Regardless of this, there is some documentary evidence of this trip and its relatively short duration.

One of the known facts of this trip was a particular visit to an island named Nothing Atoll. It is the sister string to the famous Bikini Atoll named after what the women wore on the beach. Nothing Atoll was similarly named.[1]

While visiting this island Anton happened upon a large structure, much like a warehouse with minimal security in place but no visible guards. Upon entering the structure there were many pieces of strange apparatus inside. He snapped a picture or two and then a guard appeared and ushered him out of the building. He was then told to leave the island and tell no one of his visit there.

It was only by careful reconstruction of the records of this trip and the date on the photo that the picture shown below can be attributed to the warehouse. After considerable research and careful assembly of seemingly unrelated events and comments Anton made over the years it has been determined that the picture is the only unclassified record of the Mark II Recombobulator constructed during World War II.

The original Recombobulator was developed in Oak Ridge, Tennessee during World War II as a result of the Manhattan Project activities there. It seems that the activities to produce Uranium 235 by electromagnetic, gaseous, and thermal enrichment had some unusual side effects on the workers. While the workers were carefully shielded from the radioactive results of the process there were other side effects from the magnetic enrichment - they became discombobulated.

[1] Actually the atoll was originally named Eschscholz Atoll in the 1820s by a Russian explorer but has always been called Bikini Atoll by the natives—something to do with coconuts in their native language. As more and more workers evidenced these symptoms it became obvious some process must be developed to bring these workers back to normal. The top local scientists were placed on probation until they developed a way to treat the symptoms. The Recombulator was the result of that effort.

The first recombobulator was developed in secret within the secret facility because no one wanted the top brass to know that the plans had failed to provide protection for the workers from the reverse magnetic fields. This was the origin of double secret probation.

The first few test runs of the Recombobulator were made in early 1944 with a select few of the mildest cases. These people were then studied for several days to see if the ill effects of the reverse spin condition were neutralized. Most of the men were cured but none of the women. They decided to build another, improved recombobulator - thus was born the Mark II Recombobulator.

Since is was women who remained infected with discomboulation the male scientists were removed from double secret probation and they were able to resume partying.


