VANITY CALL SIGN FEE TO DROP SEPTEMBER 6

The regulatory fee to obtain or renew an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will drop slightly starting with applications received by the FCC on or after Wednesday, September 6, the FCC's Wireless Telecommunications Bureau (WTB) said this week. The new fee will be \$20.80 for the 10-year license term. This year promises to be a big one for vanity call sign renewals, since the initial round of vanity grants under the current system occurred in 1996. Licensees who want to retain vanity call signs issued under the current (post-1995) system must pay the regulatory fee when renewing. From The ARRL Letter Vol. 25, No. 31, August 4, 2006

IN EARLIER DAYS

Before I got my ham ticket 5 meters was our high frequency band. While in high school a friend and I built a portable 5 meter rig. Neither of us were licensed. In fact there were quite a few unlicensed operations in Omaha at that time. The RI (Radio Inspector) made frequent visits to Omaha and when he did come word quickly got out and antennas came down and the band became silent. After a week or so our illegal activities resumed, and so did studies for licenses. At that time the code speed requirement was 13 wpm. The examination required written answers and drawn circuit diagrams. Des Moines or Kansas City was the closest place for taking the exam.

The thing I remember most about our first portable rig was it's weight. Since neither of us had a car we walked. Those old 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ volt dry cells and 45 volt batteries were heavy. We were not mobile we were portable. A black suit case contained our receiver and transmitter which had to be opened to get on the air.

As I remember, the transmitter was a single 19 type tube in a tuned plate, tuned grid push pull circuit, and loop modulated. That is, a loop of wire from a telephone F1 microphone was carefully inserted into the plate tank circuit. Looking back, this form of modulation worked fairly well in low power rigs, but I wouldn't recommend it for KW rigs. I believe the receiver was also a one tube affair, and ear phones were the state of the art.

In my last year of high school I studied for my license. The examination was to be changed to multiple choice answers. Great. But a week before our planned trip to Des Moines for the exam we got word that the new multiple choice exam was delayed. Frantically we prepared to write everything out long hand. I made it, and in 1940 I received W9PHW as my call.

The ARRL has announced that, due to changes in its definitions of political vs. geographic entities in the DXCC rules, **Swain's Island is now considered a separate DXCC entity**. The island is part of American Samoa, but is more than 350 kilometers from the main island group, so it qualifies under the geographic separation rule. Contacts made with Swain's Island on or after July 22, 2006, will be counted for DXCC credit.

New Technician Class Question Pool is Effective July 1 (Jun 30, 2006) --A significantly revised and updated Technician class (Element 2) question pool goes into effect for all Technician class examinations offered as of Saturday, July 1. ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, says ARRL VEC is ready for the changeover.
