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UNITED CEREBRAL PALSY DRIVE

Twenty messages were handled and operation was complete about 5:00 p.m.





Honored particularly for their efforts were Dr. Stan Bach, WAØIIX, and H. L. Tinley, KØGHK, who were made honorary citizens of Boys Town.

The officers of the new Radio Amateur Society are: John H. Smith, President; Bernard Stacy, Vice President; and Bernard Meyer, Secretary and Treasurer, President Smith was the Master of Ceremonies and the new general licenses just procured by the following four boys were presented by Msgr. Wegner; Paul Lambric, Bernard Meyer, John Smith, and Bernard Stacy.

Msgr. Wegner also presented to the Society a new Galaxy V which was accepted in behalf of the Club by President John Smith. With this we all adjourned to the Radio Shack in the Field House where the new transmitter was fired up. In commemoration of the occasion Msgr. After about three trys they made a contact, and from then on many stations were calling to participate in this first operation of the Boys Town station.

Your supply may be requested by mail or preferably by radiogram addressed to the Nebraska Centennial Commission at Hotel Lincoln in Lincoln, Nebraska. Give your name-address-call letters.

NEBRASKA CENTENNIAL COM-MISSION AMATEUR RADIO AWARD PROGRAM

- 1. For Amateurs Outside Nebraska
 - A. A Centennial Certificate will be awarded for 5 VHF or 15 HF contacts.
 - First ten certificates will be personally signed by Nebraska Governor.
 - Contacts must be between February 3, 1966, and August 31, 1967.
 - 3. Applications for certificate should be addressed to Nebraska Centennial Commission, Lincoln Hotel, Lincoln, Nebraska 68508, and should include applicant's name, address and call sign; and should list stations contacted including call sign, date, time and band. QSL's should not be sent in.
 - Applications will be crossreferenced to logs sub-

- mitted to Commission by Nebraska amateurs.
- A special contest will be held during the period from March 1, 1967, to August 31, 1967.
 - 1. The individual design ator in each state, each Canadian province and in each country reporting the most contacts with Nebraska stations will receive a commission as an admiral in the Nebraska Navy signed by the Governor of the State of Nebraska. VHF contacts will be weighed by a formula based upon total contacts of each class.
 - Logs for this award must be received by the Nebraska Centennial Commission not later than October 15, 1967,
 - and should include stations worked, date, time and band.

II. For Nebraska Amateurs

- A. A Centennial Certificate will be awarded to each Nebraska amateur, if logs sent in by outstate amateurs indicate 10 VHF or 25 HF contacts.
- B. A commission as admira. In Nebraska Navy will be awarded to the ten Nebraska amateurs who are reported the most times for contacts during

the period March 1, 1966, to August 31, 1967. Five awards for VHF activity and five for HF.

- C. Nebraska amateurs will qualify for awards by mailing to the Centennial Commission a log showing stations worked, date, time and band. This log which will be provided by the Centennial Commission will be mailed in monthly or as filled, if earlier, and will serve as application for additional cards.
- III. Other special contests or awards may be announced from time to time.
- IV. Any Amateurs having questions should send a radiogram to WAOCKX via one of the evening storm nets.




OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 45 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CONN FEB 4 1966 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

FCC this week dismissed a request for rulemaking RM-562 January 23, 1964 which would have outlawed on-the-air amateur contests and operating awards, and which would have forbidden the playback of recorded amateur signals. FCC found that such activities may well help amateurs meet the objectives of section 97.1, as for instance Field Day serving as practice for emergency communications and proving ground for emergency equipment. It further found that the noncontest operator could always find available channels for his desired operations. FCC felt that since so little playback of recordings was taking place on the amateur bands no FCC action was required. Further details will appear in April QST AR **********
