Stations may be worked once on each band. Exchange QSO number, RS/RST, and QTH (County for Nebraska stations; State, Province or country for all others).

SCORING

For Nebraska Stations: 1 point for each outstate QSO, multiplied by the number of states, provinces or foreign countries worked.

For Out of State Stations: 1 point for each Nebraska QSO multiplied by the number of Nebraska counties worked.

SUGGESTED APPROXIMATE FRE-QUENCIES:

CW and Phone: 3525 & 3982; 7025 & 7225; 14070 & 14290; 21070 & 21400; 28065 & 28650.

AWARDS

For Nebraska Stations: Bronze Centennial Medallion to the top five (5) for each mode: Certificates to the top ten (10) scorers for each mode: Certificates to top scorer in each county for each mode. Special awards for VHF and novices.

For Out of State Stations: Bronze Centennial Medallion to top scorer in each call distreprovince or country for each mode: Certificates to top three scorers in each state, province or country for each mode. Special awards for VHF and novices.

(Nebraska operators to submit a separate log of the QSO Party.)

Mailing deadline for logs is July 11, 1967. Only logs submitted in GMT will be accepted for awards. Mail logs to Nebraska Centennial Commission, Lincoln Hotel, Lincoln, Nebraska 68501.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 107 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CONN APRIL 6 1967 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

Messages must not be important enough to be sent by commercial channels and neither operator may have any pecuniary interest in the traffic. In addition, both countries have signed a reciprocal operating agreement. The agreements w concluded March 31 and became effective April 30. OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 108 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CONN APRIL 13, 1967 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

Many parts of the United States will shift to Daylight Savings Time effective April 30, on which date all WIAW operation will change to Daylight Savings Time. Eastern Amateurs in areas remaining Standard Time are reminded that W1AW Official and Special Bulletins, twice daily code practice transmissions, propagation forecasts and any other announced ARRL Headquarters Station Operating activities will have to be tuned in one hour earlier than usual. 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1967 ARMED FORCES DAY COMMUNICATIONS TESTS

Each year on the third Saturday in May the Department of Defense sponsors the observance of Armed Forces Day. As a part of this observance the Departments of the Army, Navy and Air Force annually conduct communication tests designed to demonstrate to the world the close partnership and mutual respect enjoyed between U.S. amateur radio operators and the U.S. military. This year's program will be conducted on Saturday, May 20, 1967 and all licensed radio amateurs are encouraged to participate.

The wholehearted support of the American people is basic to a strong Department of Defense. Such support requires knowledge and understanding of what the Department is doing and why it is doing it. Throughout the years amateur radio has consistently made contributions to communications training, international goodwill, military morale and the general public service. The Armed Forces Day Communication Tests are intended to be a tangible demonstration of the firm and long standing Department of Defense policy to encourage and support amateur radio activity.

On this eighteenth observance of Armed Forces Day, several military radio stations will participate in communication tests which include military-to-amateur crossband operations and receiving contests for both continuous wave (CW) and radioteletypewriter (RTTY) modes of operation.

Special OSL cards confirming crossband communications will be forwarded to those amateurs who establish two-way contact with participating military stations. Certificates will be awarded to those who aptly demonstrate their operating ability and technical skill by receiving a perfect copy of the Secretary of Defense originated "CW" and/or "RTTY" message(s) transmitted during the receiving portion of the communication tests. Interception by short wave listeners (SWL) will not qualify for a QSL card in confirmation of crossband communications. However, anyone who has the equipment and abilities may copy the Secretary of Defense messages and receive a certificate.

MILITARY TO AMATEUR CROSS-BAND TEST

Military radio stations WAR, NSS, NPG and AIR will be on the air from 201400 GMT to 210245Z GMT. During this test of crossband operations, the military stations will transmit on specified military frequencies while amateur statio will transmit in the indicated portions of the amateur bands. Contacts will consist of a brief exchange of locations and signal reports. No traffic handling will be permitted.

RTTY RECEIVING CONTEST

A radioteletypewriter "RTTY" receiving contest will be conducted for any individual amateur or station possessing the required equipment. is is a test of the operator's technical skill in aligning and adjusting his equipment, and serves to demonstrate the growing number of amateurs becoming skilled in this method of

rapid communications. The "RTTY" broadcast will consist of a special Armed Forces Day message from the Secretary of Defense to all radiotele-typewriter enthusiasts. The message will be transmitted at 60 words per minute in accordance with the following schedule:

SUBMISSION OF COMPLETION OF ENTRIES

Transcriptions should be submitted ''as received.'' No attempt should be made to correct possible transmission errors.

Time, frequency and call sign of the station copied as well as the name, call sign (if any) and address of the individual submitting the entry must be indicated on the page containing the text. Each year a large number of perfect copies are received with insufficient information, thereby precluding the issuance of a certificate.

Completed entries should be submitted to the Armed Forces Day Contest, Room 5A522, The Pentagon, Washington, D.C. 20315 and postmarked no later than 31 May 1967.

During the weekend of April 15-16, successful QSO's were made between W2IMU/2 and HB9RG and G3LTF on 432 Mc, moonbounce. A similar series of tests are scheduled for April 22 between 1900 and 2400 GMT and April 23 between 2000 and 2400 GMT. W2FZY/2 will be transmitting on 432 Mc. plus or minus one Kc. using a 60 foot dish antenna, for example 1900 to 1905, 1910 to 1915, and listening during the even five minute periods. Stations wishing to schedule W2FZY/2 should call Dick Turrin 201-949-3504 or Roger Abson 201-949-4152.
