

Well, here it is June already. It doesn't seem possible but Field Day is close at hand-to be specific, June 24-25. Your Field Day Compittee has been hard at work getting ags lined up for the big day.

While at the Field Day site, we decided how the rigs were to be placed. This is the best site I have ever seen. It is on fairly high ground, out away from such QRN as high power lines and super highways. Also, there is a real nice shelter which will house the cook shack, space for eating, and the 20 meter station, plus the 80-15 and 10 meter station. The 6 meter station will be on the highest ground with its beam on the tower which is on the Club mobile unit. The 40 meter station will make use of this tower also for its antenna.

There will be four rigs running this year instead of three. They are as follows: 6 meters, 20 meters, 40 meters, and 80-15-10 meters. We decided on four rigs for two main reasons. First, it will give more people a chance to operate and take part in Field Day; and second, we believe we can average more contacts per rig and, therefore, increase our chances to make a better showing.

WRL for the use of these rigs.



An item of interest - a prize will be given for the most active person at Field Day. This includes everything from operating to chief cook and bottle washer. Get more details at the June meeting.

Your Committee has worked hard the last few months getting everything organized, but the final test comes on June 24-25. Field Day is a Club project and, therefore, how well we do depends on each and every one of us. Let's make this a Club project and make Field Day 1967 the best ever.

We have two challenges this year: Bellevue Amateur Radio Club, WØWYV, and the Boys Town Amateur Radio Society, WAØOGI. How about it gang? Let's show 'em how to rack up points!

SCIENCE FAIR

It was very gratifying to see a novice ham radio operator at the key among the Omaha area display of science projects at the Science Fair which was held in the Field House, University of Omaha. Pat, WNOPMW, was operating a Heath HX11 transmitter on a quarter-wave dipole antenna with a Hallicrafter S-108 receiver. Here are Pat's own words about his project:

"Radio was invented by a man working on his own with his own resources. All of the early advances in communication were pioneered by men working on their own. Even today, with all of the complicated and costly laboratories owned by large companies, many of the new discoveries are first tried out by the scientists at home using their amateur radio licenses.

"A radio amateur starting out on code learns to tune his ears as well as his radio, and after a number of years of code it is almost a second language to him. There is only one way a man can get 10 years' experience: - that is to start 10 years prior to the time.

"This is amateur radio: - You can start small, there is no limit to how far you can go. For the beginner, the first problem is an antenna - how can it be installed in a modern residential neighborhood and still look right? After that comes the problem of operation. Then he is ready for a transmitter with m power, and then come modifications to the receiver. There is no stopping place."

ARRL MIDWEST DIVISION CON-VENTION AND NATIONWIDE QSL BARBECUE

June 24 & 25, 1967 ---North Platte, Nebraska

June 24, 1967 the ARRL Midwest Division Convention will be held at North Platte, Nebraska, with the Holiday Inn serving as Convention Headquarters. Registration will begin at 10:00 a.m. All those attending must register at the desk, and they will be given an I.D. Badge. Registration will be \$5.00.

The North Platte Radio Club will start monitoring 3.950 and 3.982 Friday, June 23 at 9:00 a.m., and will continue as talk-in stations throughout the day and evening. Talk-in stations will be set up at Convention Headquarters by 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 24, 1967. Sunday June 25, 1967 talk-in stations will be set up at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds by 9:00 a.m. Two meters will also be in operation during that time.

The Convention program will start approximately 1:30 p.m., with a forum conducted by ARRL officials. This will be followed by a meeting concerning the Nebraska Amateur dio Clubs and future programming of Conventions, etc.

At 3:00 p.m. Mr. Herman Philcheck from Washington, D.C. and representing Air Force Mars will conduct a meeting and speak on subjects of interest to the Amateurs. This will be followed by displays and talks by officials from Hy-Gain Electronics of Lincoln, Nebraska on beams, antennas, etc.

At 4:00 p.m. C. J. Walker, W4SSN, Assistant Chief from Washington, D.C. representing Navy Mars, will conduct a meeting of interest to the Amateurs. This is to be followed by a gallant young speaker representing Boys Town in Omaha, Nebraska. Boys Town Radio Club will be working Field Day at these events, with special QSL cards made up for this occasion.

At 5:00 p.m. there will be a break until approximately 6:15 for the Banquet. The Invocation for the Banquet will be given by Father Kremier, WOGMS, from Sutherland, Nebraska.

Following the Banquet, the next O.T. will be honored and inducted into the Nebraska Amateur Radio Club Hall of Fame. Immediately after, Convention prizes will be given, climaxing the 1967 ARRL Midwest Division Convention. A Convention like this is only as good as the Electronics Firms and Amateurs want to make it, so give your support to your ARRL Conventionput Amateur Radio on the map--and make it one of the best.

During this entire day, WRL and Galaxy Electronics will be having the famous Galaxy in operation and other Amateur gear on display. Hy-Gain Electronics will display their beams and other products of interest to the Amateurs. Hallicrafters will demonstrate the "Mite

of the Mighty" S.R. 2000 transceivers, plus other Hallicrafters gear. Other electronic firms have indicated they will be present. There will be an ARRL display and literature of interest to the Hams.

A Trophy will be given to the Licensed Amateur that has traveled the farthest distance. A prize will go to the youngest amateur and also to the oldest ticket represented, when registering for oldest ticket. Proof must be presented, such as an O.T. certificate or copy of first ticket with date will be accepted A Swap table and a For Sale table will be available, so bring your extra gear or trading stock.

June 25, 1967--the Nationwide QSL Barbecue will be held at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds, approximately 4 miles west of North Platte. Prime Nebraska Beef will be furnished by the Nebraska Stock Growers Association. See this prime premium beef barbecued Western Style. The Barbecue and program will start at approximately 11:00 a.m. Displays will be located in the huge quonset hut, located near the south end of the grounds. Speakers and displays will be scheduled from the ARRL Convention, with the Centennial Commission supplying a noted speaker for these events, and also door prizes.

For those Amateurs who wish to spend a weekend in North Plattethere are many sights and sports in this area, such as Cody's Scout Rest Ranch, boating, fishing, water skiing, etc. There are plenty of parking accommodations available for campers and trailers, and also camping grounds near Lake Maloney, six miles south of North Platte.

The famous Buffalo Bill Rodeo will be in progress June 22-23-24-25, with a colorful parade on Thursday, June 22nd. There will be plenty exciting events--bronc riding, barrel racing, chuck wagon races, and many other attractions. Those Amateurs wishing to attend the Rodeo following the Barbecue will have time to do so.

More programming is being processed at this writing, but is not yet completed. So put these dates on your schedule, and see us at North Platte's -- First ARRL Midwest Convention!

OPERATING PROCEDURE

Maritime Mobile, and Aeronautical Mobile operation occur ONLY when the position is outside the continental United States. A boar on a lake (even the Great Lake is not Maritime Mobile; a plane flying over the US is not Aeronautical Mobile. Such operation is handled, for operating procedure, precisely like an automobile.

It has become popular in the case of boats to sign "marine mobile" when operating in the US limits. But correct operating procedure calls for a statement of location when operating phone and NOT the call area. Portable 6 or mobile 7 is incorrect operating procedure. The operator's geographical location must be given.

A newly developed device which could be a breakthrough in antenna development is described in the April 24th edition of Electronic News. The device is known as the Subminiature Integrated Antenna or SIA. It has been developed at the Air Force Avionics Lab at Wright-Patterson AF Base in Ohio. Quote from the American Almanac Year-Book 1903

While the transmission of intelligence by the aid of electricity is a very old story, even the telephone having long ago lost every element of noveltry, the interest of investigators and inventors in this field of usefulness for the wonderful element, which has become so valuable a servant within less than three-quarters of a century, was never greater than it is at present, and there was never a time when every new disclosure in connection with their work was more eagerly watched for by the world in general. Wireless telegraphy had become an accomplished fact prior to the year 1902, but much remained to be done in developing it, and much is yet to be accomplished. Wireless telephony also is an assured fact, although it requires even more of development than the other before it can be of any benefit, or can be brought into practical use.

ANTENNA LENGTHS

Length of half-wave antenna (feet) = 468 (horizontal antenna only) Freq. (Mc.)

Length of half-wave ancenna (reet) = 490 (drooping 45 degrees) Freq. (Mc.)

The actual length of a half-wave cenna will not be exactly equal to the half-wave in space, but depends upon the thickness of the conductor in relation to the wavelength. An additional shortening effect occurs

with wire antennas supported by insulators at the ends because of the capacitance added to the system by the insulators (end effect).
