CANOE RACE 1968

The seventh annual Canoe Race of the South District Explorers was held on June 1st. It was the best race so far on the Platte River for Explorers. The chief judge was 2ct. Col. Stu Burtt; chief timekeeper was Chuck Casey. Presentation of awards was by Mark Nickolson, new District Commissioner. Race chairman was Lt. Ave Brooks who, with the help of others on his staff, did a great job getting things set up.

Seven canoes started at Camp Eagle. Canoe #3, Post 95B, was pulled at Camp Sokol. Canoe #1, Post 58A, won first place again this year with a total time of 9 hours and 55 minutes. In second place was Canoe #6, Post 95A; third place was Canoe #8, Post 58B; fourth place was Canoe #4, Post 478; fifth was Canoe #2, Post 363; and sixth was Canoe #7, Post 77.



In addition to the antennas normally in the Club emergency gear, Jim Anderson, KØDNE, loaned the Club his TH4 tribander. Jim, with the help of Chuck Michel, KØQVL, removed the tribander from his tower also receiving assistance and mosupport from Sharlene, Jim's XYL. Jim and Sharlene are new members and have really jumped in to assist the Club's efforts.

The rigs included Galaxy V, Mark 2's for the 3 HF stations, loaned by WRL and Galaxy; and, for the VHF station, a Clegg Venus, supplied by Bob Lockwood, WAODHU; and a home brew, 2 meter FM rig, plied by Jim Droege, WOYCP. To guard against Murphy's law, we had one additional Galaxy V, Mark 2 and a Gonset G-50, loaned by Harold McClenahan, WAØDGA. Our special thanks go to Galaxy, WRL, Bob, Harold and Jim for the use of these rigs. Due to the dependability of the rigs, we had no Murphy problems. If we had not had the extra gear, we undoubtedly would have.

Murphy did, however, enter the 75 meter shack. We worked 15 meters until just before sundown June 22nd, when we shifted to 75 meters. The antenna tuner, supplied by Dave Moses, WAQGED, was used on 75 to allow operation on either phone or CW.

The rig was loaded and the tuner was adjusted to achieve a 1 to 1 SWR - Real Pretty. Shortly thereafter it was discovered that the 75 meter rig was not loading properly. Upon inspection we found that the trouble was caused by the inductor, which was shorted against the cabinet of the tuner. Unfortunately, the inspection was not made prior to the trip to town and much gnashing of teeth, and thanks to Mr. Murphy--shut down time about the hours.

Attention DXers. Announcement nereby made of two deletions to the ARRL Countries List. These deletions are VS9H Kuria Muria and ZC6 Palestine, Contacts made with Kuria Muria November 30, 1967 and after will be considered the same as contacts with the Sultanate of Muscat and Oman. The ZC6 Palestine listing, comprised of the UN Truce Area bordering on Israel, no longer exists. Therefore, that listing is being deleted. Honor Roll totals which will appear in December 1968 OST will have these two deletions made automatically AR *********



On June 24 the Senate passed and sent to the President a bill, HR 14910, which will permit the Federal Communications Commission to regulate the manufacture, import, sale, shipment and use of incidental radiation devices capable of causing interference to radio communicans. NOTES FROM TEXAS SOUTHMOST A.R.C., INC.

This is the Southern Tip of Texas. This is border country. This is a land of palm trees and sunshine, of citrus groves and lettuce ranches. It is a land of tortillas and beans. of margaritas and tequila sours. It is a land of cactus and roses, of yucca and bougainvillea, thorny plants all. In legend and song it is a land of romance, a land of violence, a land of kindly charity, and a land of manana. It is a land which is much, much different than one might imagine -- one who has never visited down here, that is. It is a land which will make you want to stay if you ever do wander in and look with more than a flickering glance and listen with the heart more than with the ear.

It is also a land in which one will find fewer than a hundred hams in the three county area made up of Cameron, Hydalgo and Willacy Counties. In fact, you can add Starr County and we still can't muster a full one hundred hams. Look at your map. You will see Brownsville at the southern tip, Raymondville 50 miles to the north and McAllen 60 miles to the northwest. It is part of the U.S.A. in which 75 phone is strictly a nighttime band, except on Sundays. Our Sunday nets are on 75, the rest of the time one cannot find enough of us on the air at any given time to be assured of a 75 meter contact! The rest of the bands are great, but the centers of population are too far north for us to do much prospecting on 75 in the daytime.

There are three ham clubs on the U.S. side of the Rio Grande and at least two more on the Mexican side. Texas Southmost ARC, Inc., draws its members from Camer County, though we don't really like it to that. Carbide Amateur Radio Club of Brownsville, better known as CARBOB, is made up of employees of the Union Carbide Plant. The Magic Valley Radio Amateurs is the name of the club at McAllen, the "upper end of the valley."

Across the river from Brownsville is the Radio Club de H. Matamoros. It has but recently been organized but is quite active. They already have a club field day and had a wonderful time. There is another club at Reynosa, across the river from McAllen. All of the Mexican hams are quite emergency conscious. They did a great job during Hurricane Beulah. Their efforts at that time, along with a history of similar heroic performances, have caused the Mexican Government to grant the Mexican hams franking privileges for their QSL cards. That is a rather unique honor to have been given the entire group.

The hams on both sides of the border are using the experiences of Hurricane Beulah to become organized for some future emergency. Antenna installations are much stronger now. We have two or three complete stations, and extra power supplies assigned to each emgency operating point. And, best of all, we will have a two meter link between U.S. hams and the Mexican hams so that there will be a more rapid interchange of vital information.

And there you have it, the story of the Southern Tip of Texas. It is called the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas, but it is really not a valley in the dictionary meaning of the word.

Come on down to Brownsville. ir you fly in, W5KR will give you traffic and landing instructions. If you become ill, K5MSQ will give you a real good examination and W5DX will fill the prescription. W5KFI will take care of your teeth. K5SJA will help fix your Ford, and K5MFS will try to sell you a camera or at least some film.

It is really wonderful country. No, I do not work for the Chamber of Commerce, but who knows - I'll need a job when I retire.
