NOVEMBER MEETING

Virgil Wamsat, an Omaha architect with Virgil Wamsat and Associates, and John McLaughlin and Lou Chaffee, president and sales representative respectively, from Solar, Inc., Mead, Nebraska, presented a most interesting and unusual evening...Solar Energy!

Virgil and John concentrated on the basics of solar energy consisting of solar collector panels, a solar storage furnace and a conventional forced air heat distribution system. Sun radiation passes through the glass in the collector and is absorbed by a specially designed metal plate. Air trapped between the glass and the metal plate is heated, and then blown into the solar storage furnace. The storage medium (the most common are water, rocks or eutectic salts) is heated to a temperature of about 150° F. When the living area calls for heat, hot air is drawn off the solar furnace and distributed by conventional means.

Systems in existence today have the ability to draw heat from five to ten days without solar radiation input to the storage furnace. Heavy insulation in the ceiling, side walls and between floors and an auxiliary conventional heating unit is recommended for efficiency and security.

Many questions were asked and more questions unanswered in the minds of the 100 in attendance. Thank you, Virgil, John and Lou, for an unusual amateur radio evening.

EDITORIAL – WORLDRADIO NEWS

November 10, 1976

Dick,

This is the text of the editorial written by Armond Noble for the November issue of Worldradio News.

On the 8th, 9th and 10th of October I attended the ARRL Midwest Division Convention in Omaha, Nebraska.

Over the years I've attended many conventions, and this one ranks right at the very top. Yes, in Mid-America there is enthusiasm. There is energy. These people are excited about what they are doing.

Possibly they take Amateur Radio a bit more seriously than other areas. They told me of the role they played during tornadoes and crippling snowstorms.

The people I met in Omaha have zip and zing. They have drive. For but one example — As I look at many club bulletins, it seems a constant problem in getting someone to be editor. Another problem is the volunteers to help with the folding, stapling, etc.

On the other hand, we have Ham-Hum, the publication of the Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club (sponsors of the convention). This is as professional as you could ask for, both in appearance and content.

Every club must ask itself what is the difference between that group and our group? What is it that winds them up?

Strange, while some divisions can't even put on a convention every year, this convention had such depth in its program that there were usually three seminars going on at once. And, bless their hearts, they had a special program for the Novice. (Many conventions could do well to copy such an idea.)

There were quite a few technical forums such as the one by my friend Denny Had on antenna matching, and they prevailed upon Gus Browning to talk about DX. There were programs about AMSAT and MARS. And showing the concern those in the Midwest have, one seminar was about helping the handicapped via the Handi-Ham System. Others dealt with Disaster Communications, Weather Communications and Communications Support of Disaster Agencies.

At the dinner I sat next to Harry Dannals, W2HD, president of the ARRL. We also sat next to each other at the Pacific Division Convention a few weeks earlier in San Jose, CA.

Seeing the awards passed out at the Midwest Convention and the recognition of outstanding amateurs and their contributions, I commented to Harry that these folks seemed to be more "involved" than I was accustomed to seeing.

For one thing, this convention drew many more amateurs than the Pacific event.

If we take off the Hawaii membership of my division, the memberships of the Pacific and Midwest are about the same, yet the Midwest drew far more. And look at this, the distance across Nebrask alone is about the same as from San Francisco to San Diego (which is in another division). This is not even to speak of those who came from Iowa, Kansas and Missouri.

My section (Sacramento Valley) has almost as many amateurs as the entire state of Nebraska. We're just a couple hours drive from San Jose. And of course, the bulk of this division's mbers are right in the San Francisco—San Jose area, not 450 miles away such as Omaha to St. Louis, yet their convention outdrew the Pacific Division.

By now some jaded New Yorker is going, "Haw haw. Well what else is there to do out there?"

Make no mistake, people out there are not "out in the country." Omaha, for example, is a hard-charging aggressive business community. Its people are well-dressed and sophisticated. Yes, they are different than the big-city people, different in a refreshing way. Warm, open, not jaded or blase, they are vibrant and they participate. Maybe the fact that they are not being suffocated by smog has something to do with it.

In their printed program (another professional job), right off the bat, putting it out where everybody could see, they said, "Your convention committee hopes you will find this convention a rewarding experience and indeed a convention to mention for years to come." Well, that's pretty much like putting your money where your mouth is. When you put a statement like that out front, you'd pretty well be able keep your promise. They had nothing to fear.

For me at least it was a "rewarding xperience" and it was certainly worth mentioning.

Those are nice people in the Midwest, Many others could take lessons from them. It was a real pleasure to be around such bright and shiny people.

The impression that most people have of the Midwest is that they are hardworking, conservative people. Yes, that's true, and I wish there were more like them. Square, some people might call them. Yes, in the sense of a square deal, square shooter.

On the other hand, part of the program was a demonstration of Mid-Eastern belly dancing (and I've never seen such even at a Southwestern Division Convention in Los Angeles, hi) and you can't outdrink those Midwesterners. I had to give it up and go to bed. The next morning (Sunday) I ran into one of the guys and told him that he looked how I felt. He said that he hadn't gone to bed. Tough people in the Midwest.

Seriously, these were people who set out with determination to do something, and they did it. They are certainly entitled to the satisfaction that comes with a job well done, and they are entitled to the thanks for a lot of hard work by the people who attended and enjoyed themselves.

There was a vitality at that convention. It was a pleasure to see them honor their "Outstanding Amateur of the Year" in the division. They gave recognition to one who had been teaching licensing classes for the past seven years, and they gave kudos to those who operate the "Buddy System." That's when a person graduates from a licensing class, he or she is just not thrown out alone into the world of ORM, but is assigned a "counselor" to fall back on with questions, etc. Great idea, maybe more will do it.

So, a tip of the hat from this corner to the Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club, Inc., of Omaha, Nebraska.

Wouldn't it be nice if every club in the country had the vitality that they do!
