### Minutes of the Board

The November meeting of the Board of Trustees was called to order at 7:05 PM by President Jim Sanford, NØ AIH. Members present were:

Jim-NØAIH; Jay-KB8TR; Greg-NØBTN; Larry-KCØR; Ken-KDØP; Doug-KØBOY; Jim-N5DZZ; Jim-WBØQGV; Scott-WBØQPP; and Ellen-WBØHWF. Guests present were: Mitch-NØAZF and Bill-WBØVGR.

Committee Reports:
Scott-QPP presented a proposal from the special Computer Selection Committee for purchasing a Zenith Z-148PC. Discussion occurred concerning the software and hardware. Larry-R moved to allocate a maximum of \$1900 for the purchase of a Z-148PC, and printer. Seconded by Jim-AIH. Discussion continued on the amount of the expenditure, the type of equipment being purchased, and the amount of training needed to use the software. Jim-AIH noted that the software had already been donated to the club. After discussion, a roll call vote was requested. The motion failed by a tie vote. The results of the roll call were as follows:

Doug-BOY moved the purchase of the computer be placed before the membership at the December General Membership Meeting, Seconded by Ken-P. Discussion took place concerning the procedure of the voting process. Motion passed.

The Repeater Committee reported that the 34/94 repeater had been down due to a problem in the power supply. Frequency drift is being caused by a bad crystal, which has been ordered. Problems continue with the 220 repeater. Work is in progress to resolve the problems. Weather permitting, the proper testing will be completed in the near future.

New Business:

Bill-VGR presented an idea for the Christmas Santa project. The project is planned for Saturday December 13, from 1000 to 1400 hours at several Omaha hospitals. Bill proposed the use of ATV to show Santa through the cable distribution system of the hospitals. The children could then see Santa on TV in their rooms, and talk with Santa through the 2-meter net. An attempt is being made to receive permission from the company providing Santa at the Crossroads, to use their Santa and background for the video portion of the project. If permission is not obtained, it will be necessary to for the club to rent a Santa and background. Larry-R moved to allocate a maximum of \$100 for the rental of the Santa suit and other necessary items, seconded by Doug-BOY. Motion passed.

Treasurers Report Greg-BTN gave a detailed report on revenues. Doug-BOY moved to accept the report as submitted, seconded by Scott-QPP. Motion passed 8-0 with one abstention. Greg-BTN presented four bills for payment. Doug-BOY moved to pay the bills, seconded by Jim-QGV. Motion passed 8-1.

Meeting adjourned at 9:06 PM.

## Communications Privacy Act Signed Into Law

The Electronic Communications Privacy Act, also known as Public Law 99-508, takes effect on January 17 1987. The EPCA amends the US Code, and sets new rules governing the interception of wire and oral communications.

Electronic communication is now defined as "any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or in part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic, photoelectric, or photooptical system that effects interstate or foreign commerce".

Under the law, you can legally monitor:

Any marine or aeronautical communication. Any Amateur, CB or General Mobile Radio Service transmission. Any communication transmitted for the general use of the public, or that relates to ships, aircraft, vehicles, or persons in distress. Signals causing harmful interference to any lawfully operating station or consumer electronic equipment, to the extent necessary to identify the source of the interference. Satellite transmissions of network feeds, some audio subcarriers and cable programming covered by Section 705(b) of the Communications Act. Any government, law enforcement, civil defense, private land mobile or public safety (including fire and police) radio communication system which is readily available to the public. Any other electronic communication made through a system configured so that such electronic communication is readily accessible to the general public.

Communications that are considered readily accessible are communications that are NOT scrambled or encrypted; OR NOT using modulation techniques whose essential parameters have been withheld from the public with the intention of preserving privacy; OR NOT being carried on a subcarrier of another signal subsidiary to a radio transmission; OR NOT being transmitted over a communication system provided by a common carrier, except for tone-only paging signals, and including cellular telephone systems; OR NOT being transmitted on frequencies allocated under FCC Rules Part 25 [communication relay satellite], Part 74(d) [remote broadcast pickup], Part 74(e) [aural broadcast auxiliaries, including studio-to-transmitter links], Part 74(f) [television broadcast auxiliaries and studio-to-transmitter links] or Part 94 [private fixed microwave].

You cannot legally monitor communications that do not fall into any of the above categories.

The radio portion of cordless telephone conversations are specifically exempt from Public Law 99-508, since they are "easily intercepted".

The law makes it illegal to manufacture, assemble, possess, advertise, sell, or mail any device primarily useful for the interception of electronic communications. This includes kits. This portion of the law appears to affect scanners and converters, as these items are defined in the law as "surreptitious interception devices", if the scanner is capable of monitoring any portion of the spectrum protected from monitoring.

Intentional listening of protected signals is a criminal offense, and carries penalties of up to one year in jail and a fine up to \$100,000 for the first offense.


