## OPERATION WAKEUP

At the request of the Nebraska SEC, the EC in Omaha asked the AK-SAR-BEN Radio Club to participate in the CD "Operation Wakeup". Conferences with Col. A. L. Tuttle, Sam Reynolds and A. A. Little, local CD officials, showed that communication with the State CD director at Lincoln was necessary, as well as communication with mobile units through out the city in carrying out purely local aspects of the exercise. Therefore two stations were

up in the CD office on the sixth floor in the Omaha City Hall. One on 75 and the other on ten.

The 75 meter station was a Viking Two feeding a doublet antenna. The antenna was erected Monday evening by YMU and FQB: the transmitter and receiver installed in Col. Tuttle's office by QHG, FQB and LRD. A contact was made with Kansas City.

On Friday, April 24 YMU and FQB, later joined by QHG, manned the station at 12:30. Conditions were against us from the beginning. The rain, high winds and threat of tornadoes combined to make contact with Lincoln difficult. Although 3995 was the specified freq. FQB was able to QSY to the CW band and keep in touch with Lincoln.

About two o'clock conditions improved and phone operation was renewed. Due to the poor conditions VYX of Lincoln relayed much of the tfk.

The ten meter gang had a very effective net in operation on the 29.64 MC emergency frequency. The NCS was located on the sixth floor and used a vertical folded dipole nted on the flag pole. The net operated behout a hitch and, in fact, our units

Several of the novice and technician licensees were on hand to act as message and general handymen. The club and CD officials learned a great deal about CD communications and are in a better spot for future planning. No doubt, this is true about the thirteen state area in the operation.
