Space Weather, the Sun-Earth Connection, & Ham Radio



For the May meeting, Tomas Hood, NW7US, gave a presentation on how activity on the Sun affects amateur radio activity.

In his introductory remarks, he described how, at age nine, he'd gotten interested in SWL and ham radio when listening to his parent's Sony 4-band radio (shortwave, long wave, AM, and FM). He'd wondered about the strange sounds, CW, solar weather bulletins, and

voices in different languages. It was like traveling the world without leaving home. Later, he learned code, got his Novice license and eventually obtained his Extra ticket. Along the way, he developed an interest in space weather, as he realized that conditions on the Sun would effect communications on Earth.

Using slides and videos, Tomas described those conditions. This included a short, intensive course on the structure of the ionosphere and its effect on radio—particularly HF. He discussed how the various ionospheric regions were affected by a normal day/night cycle and what happened when a solar flare occurred.

He also discussed some of the myths associated with solar weather that is glamorized by the media in order to boost ratings. Plus, he stated that it's difficult to predict space weather (NASA has a 100% failure rate). This is partly because it's a new science. Though scientists have been observing solar activity for 400 years, it's only been since the '70s that highly detailed and accurate measurements have been taken. And, considering that the Sun is over four billion years old, that's an infinitesimal amount of knowledge about its long-term behavior.

In all, the presentation was entertaining and educational. Tomas provided a lot more information than can be summarized here. For more information, please visit his web sites at: http://sunspotwatch.com/ and http://nw7us.us/.

Tales of Anton Reeh

Part I: Island Adventure

[Editor's Note: The following account was passed on to the staff of the Ham Hum by WA9ASD, who obtained it from that world traveler and adventurer, Anton Reeh, UN1QUE (and holder of many other call signs). It will perhaps give some insight into the mysterious individual who has been contributing some of the more interesting door prizes to the monthly AARC meetings.]

Anton Reeh acquired great wealth as a merchant in his home country, which allowed him to pursue his interest in radio and especially ham radio. Due to his wealth he was able to hire a staff to assist with his ventures and adventures.

On one occasion he had an opportunity to acquire some broadcasting permits in Argentina. In order to complete this deal he would have to travel to the country. Since he would be in the country for some time he had it arranged to obtain a ham license in Argentina so he could operate there. He was assigned the call of L3SS, due to his, hopefully, special status in the country.

He also had an interest in running a DXpedition, but Argentina was not a particularly rare country. One activity that had caught his interest was the *Islands On The Air* events to activate mostly uninhabited islands for other hams to contact. His trip to South America would certainly afford pursuing this so he instructed his staff to locate an island and make the travel arrangements from Argentina to it for a one-week stay for some heavy duty operating. His staff, while not fully grasping the concept of the operating event, dutifully made the arrangements and obtained a suitable special call sign for that portion of the trip.

So, Anton made the trip to Argentina and but was unfortunately unsuccessful in completing his radio permits deal. He did, however, enjoy some part-time operating from another country in anticipation of his island stay.

When he left Argentina and was

traveling on the next leg of his journey, he was reviewing the special license for the island operating event and was surprised to note his call sign was the US call sign in the tenth district of WØRTH. Thinking little of it he assumed it to be some island on the perimeter of the US.

When he finally arrived at his island location, he was able to understand how little his staff understood of his ham radio



activities. While they had dutifully picked a splendidly named island they failed on the geography part of the assignment. For who could have known that such a well named place as Grand Island would be in the middle of Nebraska, a state not known for its islands.

With these lessons in mind and a bit of tongue in cheek, Anton reversed the call signs and to his dying day referred to this as the WØRTH/L3SS DXpedition.

So, what did you buy?

I didn't really go down to Dayton with much of a shopping list. In addition to the PC boards, I did pick up a bunch of other little stuff including some strain reliefs, more clamp-on ferrite cores, a paddle pad from Vibroplex (\$1) to keep the paddle down at the club station from sliding around, and some tube sockets! One of the vendors there had a box of tube sockets that they were selling for a quarter apiece or five for a dollar. I picked out five and paid the lady, and as I was walking away, I decided that they were such a good deal that I went back and bought five more.

My biggest purchase was NT7S's OpenBeacon QRSS transmitter (www.etherkit.com). It cost me \$40. It looks like a very nice kit, and I'm hoping to be on 30m QRSS shortly with it. The nice thing about this transmitter is that it has a microcontroller that lets it transmit DFCW and Hellschreiber, in addition to CW. It should be fun to both build and operate.

Too rich for my blood

In other news, both Kenwood and FlexRadio both introduced new radios at Dayton. Perhaps the most buzz was around the Kenwood TS-990. All they were showing was a prototype under a Plexiglass cover. In addition to being incredibly expensive, the radio is huge! I heard someone joke that to produce this radio, Kenwood is going to have to corner the market on buttons and knobs. If you've seen the photo in QST (which was allegedly produced with Photoshop), you'll know what I mean.

The other radio with a bit of buzz is the new FlexRadio FLEX-6000. For the past couple of weeks, the FlexRadio website was proclaiming that this radio was going to be a game changer. Perhaps it is, but at \$6,000+, this radio is out of my league, and too expensive for the majority of radio amateurs. That being the case, I really don't know what all the buzz is about.

I'm sure that the TS-990 and the FLEX-6000 are both great radios, but I think that the law of diminishing returns applies here. At some point, are you really getting \$6,000 or \$12,000 of fun out of the radio? I don't think that I would.

Well, that's it. Another Dayton Hamvention is in the bag. It was a lot of fun, and I'm already looking forward to next year. I've already contacted one of the forum organizers about adding an adult education forum. I think that's something that's both needed and would be popular. I'll just have to make sure to leave enough time to hit the flea market and grab some more tube sockets or coax or whatever.

Dayton Hamvention 2012: Another great ham radio experience

My Dayton experience started at 3:45 am Thursday morning. That's when I had to get up so that I could make it to the Fairborn Holiday Inn in time for the first session of this year's Four Days in May (FDIM) conference. FDIM is a one-day conference put on by the QRP Amateur Radio Club International (http://qrparci.org/) and is a great way to start the "Dayton experience."

This year, we were treated to six very fine presentations. They included talks on using microcontrollers for various projects, software-defined radio, VHF and UHF for QRPers, homebrewing with "hollow state" devices (more commonly known as tubes), using open-source electronic design tools, and operating pedestrian mobile. The two talks that I enjoyed the most were "Hollow State (Thermatron) Homebrewing" by Grayson, TA2ZGE/KJ7UM and "Leveraging Free and Open Source Tools in Homebrewing" by Jason, NT7S.

Friday morning, I got up early again, so that I could make the 7:30 AM bus to the Hamvention. We arrived about 8:00 AM, just as the gates were opening. The first thing that I did was to head to the FAR Circuits tent, which is—as the name implies—at the far end of the flea market. There, I made my first purchases, a board to make a regenerative receiver and one to make an audio breakout box.

The rest of the day was a combination of wandering the aisles of the outdoor flea market, fighting the crowds inside the arena, attending seminars, and meeting people that I know. By the time 4:30 PM rolled around, I was pretty hot and tired. Temperatures topped 80 degrees, and on the blacktop surface of the flea market, temperatures were undoubtedly higher. I was happy to get on the bus and head back to the hotel.

Saturday was pretty much the same story, except it was even hotter. The temperature almost hit 90 degrees. I didn't bring any sunscreen, either, so I got a little rosy.

I ran into some people that I knew that had just come down for the day, or perhaps that I'd missed the day before. One guy I ran into at the Ohio Repeater Council booth, pulled out his new Elecraft KX-3 and gave me a quick demo. It's actually quite a cool little radio. I'm still saving up for a K-3, though.

Around noon, I went to the food court for a slice of pizza and a glass of beer. Seating is catch as catch can, so I shared a table with several other hams. This is great because you get to meet all kinds of different people.

This year, an older gentleman sat down next to me with his beer. We got to chatting, and as it turned out, this was his 55th straight year attending the Dayton Hamvention! He started going before it was even held at Hara Arena, and even after they moved to Hara, they didn't use the entire facility as they do now. I'm really glad that I got to speak with him.

Heathkit Closes Up Shop

Last month, the ARRL reported that Heathkit Educational Systems laid off most of their staff in March, 2012 and ceased operations. Amateur Radio License Class

The Ak-Sar-Ben Amateur Radio Club will be conducting a course preparing individuals to become licensed ham radio operators.
