DMR and MOTOTRBO

The September topic was about the Digital Mobile Radio (DMR) technology and Motorola's MOTOTRBO radio systems, which uses it. The talk was presented to a packed house...a lot of hams are interested in the subject. The subject was covered by two speakers, Frank Vondra, WBØQQK and Neil Johnson, WBØEMU.

Neil led off with an introduction to DMR and the technology behind it. Displaying a slide of a digital transceiver block diagram, he

walked us through its operation. Starting with the signal from the microphone, he described the transmitter audio preprocessing circuitry—filters and analog-to-digital converters—followed by the vocoder, a chip that applies digital techniques to compress the signal bandwidth before sending it to the transmitter circuitry.

He then showed that receiver operation was similar, but with the vocoder first extracting and restoring the compressed audio information before sending it to the digital-to-analog converter and output filters.

During this, Neil pointed out the differences between analog FM, DMR, D-Star, and other digital systems. He pointed out the technical superiority of DMR over D-Star, such as better weak-signal and noise-handling performance. He also pointed out the lower cost and growing popularity of DMR: D-Star is locked in by one manufacturer (Icom), while DMR radios are produced by many manufacturers.



QCWA 2014 RARE COUNTY SPECIAL EVENT

Chapter 25 of the Quarter Century Wireless Association is pleased to announce the 2014 Nebraska Rare County Activation special event. It is designed to encourage amateurs both in and out of Nebraska to activate those Nebraska counties which are considered difficult to contact. The event is aimed at making the rarer Nebraskan counties available to county hunters: for example, those earning county hunter awards and/or interested in earning a Worked All Nebraska County award.

The activity will take place entirely on Saturday, October 11th. It will start at 8:00 AM CDT (1300Z) and end at 5:00 PM CDT (2200Z). The special event station, NEØQP, will be operating from some of the counties during this period.

A preliminary list of rare counties includes the following: Boyd, Knox, Garfield, Johnson, Loup, Rock, and Sioux. also, there will be an effort to activate Washington, Burt, Cumming, Johnson, Pawnee, Boone, Holt, Perkins. Chase, and Grant counties.

The general frequencies to be used in the special event are located near the County Hunter's Net frequencies:

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CW: 7,056.5 14,056.5 21,056.5 kHz
SSB: 7.188 14.336 21.336 kHz
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Possibly not all rare counties will be activated, and some at different times. Therefore, about two weeks prior to the activity we will post a Schedule of Operations with more details (call, county, time, band). Check the ORZ website (http://grz.com/) for NEØOP (the OCWA Ch. 25 call sign).

Interested individuals and clubs are encouraged to contact Reynolds Davis, KØGND (email: ReynoldsD1@aol.com) so that we may post tentative operations schedules. Stations needing a specific county are also encouraged to contact KØGND; we will endeavor to activate that county if it is not already scheduled

TWITTER: ANOTHER TOOL IN THE HAM RADIO TOOLBOX



It all starts innocently enough. You get a computer to do your logging, and before you know it, you're working digital modes. Then, you snake an Ethernet cable down to the shack or connect to your wireless router. Pretty soon, you can't do without having a browser window open to one of the DX clusters or ReverseBeacon.Net or QRZ.Com or all three simultaneously.

Well, now there's another Internet service that I can't do without down in the shack: Twitter! I get on Twitter all the time now when I'm in the shack, and I love it. It's truly enhanced my amateur radio experience.

One of the ways it's done this is by bringing me all kinds of interesting technical information. I not only follow @hackaday and

@DIYEngineering, and @EDN.Com, but a bunch of hams who are doing fun things. I hate to list



I'm also following a couple of amateur radio retailers. Today, for example, @DXEngineering is offering \$55 off the RigExpert AA-54 Antenna Analyzer.

I also use it to get information about weather conditions and band conditions. For example, I follow @edvielmetti, who is KD8OQG. He's always tweeting about local severe weather. A Tweet from him gets me to turn on my 2m radio to monitor the local SkyWarn net.

As far as band conditions go, I throw out a Tweet, asking about band conditions, and in seconds, I'll get reports from my followers here in the U.S. and around the world. I try to do my part as well. When I fire up the rig, I'll Tweet out a report of how the bands seem to me.

While all of this is great, it's really all about the people. I currently have more 2,200 followers and I follow more than 900. I would never have met some of these hams if it wasn't for Twitter, and I have since worked several of them on the air after first meeting them on Twitter. Last May, we had a "Tweetup" at the Dayton Hamvention. There were at least 20 of us there. How cool is that?

Twitter isn't for everyone, but I'd encourage you to give it a try. I'm having a lot of fun on Twitter, and I think you will, too. If you do set up a Twitter account, please follow me, @kb6nu. If you mention that you read this column, I'll be sure to follow you back.

Neil went on to talk about the theory behind digital signal processing, including FDMA (Frequency Division Multiple Access), TDMA (Time Division Multiple Access), and embedded signaling techniques, among others. He also gave an overview of testing DMR audio quality, along with photos of lab equipment, software, and test procedures. This included recordings that compared DMR to D-Star under various conditions, such as weak signal and high background noise.

Following Neil's technical presentation, Frank took over to describe the history of DMR, its growing popularity, hardware availability, and how it's networked. He pointed out its advantages: superior RF performance, affordability, greater battery life, mobile roaming functionality (auto handoff from one repeater to another), and two different voice channels from one repeater (TDMA).

Frank described the DMR repeater architecture and compared it to an analog repeater—which requires nearly twice the hardware. He talked about how the DMR repeater system originated in the United States with the Motorola Amateur Radio Club (DMR-MARC). It started with only a handful of people and has now grown to over 800 repeaters and 9000 users in 22 countries since 2009.

Frank concluded his talk by describing other developments, such as talk groups, a test reflector for checking the quality of your signal, a DMR Sandbox talk group (used for experimenting with new features), plus others.

A hands-on session of DMR followed the talks. Frank, Neil, and Kevin Faris, KIØPY, demonstrated how two radios could share the same channel on a repeater without interfering with each other: Frank (and later Pat KØCTU) was talking on one channel to George KBØZZT in Independence, Kansas, while Kevin, on the other channel, was talking to another station on a worldwide talk group. They simultaneously connected to someone in Ohio and carried on a three-way conversation. In all cases, the audio was very clear.

In all, it was an extremely interesting and educational evening. If you'd like to get in on this branch of ham radio, you can find contact information on page 7 and a list of repeaters below.
