The Electro-Voice people, manufacturers of RME equipment have been toying around with the idea of a super deluxe 3 band converter covering 11/4. 2 and 6 meters. They say it would have a sensitivity and sig/noise ratio surpassing current single band converters and obtainable only in equipment made for radio astronomy. It would be in one case about the size of the RME 4350A receiver and sell for about \$239.00. It would be crystal controlled on 11/4 and 2 meters and tunable on 6. They are still in the thinking stage on this project and trying to determine if the amateur will pay the asking price for a high quality converter. If the idea strikes you as favorable, why not drop them a line letting them know your thoughts.


#### **PANCAKES**

Sunday Feb. 23, saw fifteen mobiles afield pursuing assumed duties for the 1958 Heart Fund drive. Also parwere personnel ticipating manning 3 two meter, 1 ten meter and one six meter base station as well as personnel handling the dispatching of traffic. The drive started for amateurs about 2:00 P.M. and traffic began to pile up while we were waiting for the mobiles to reach their territories. It wasn't long however before the base and relay stations began to move traffic in fine shape and were soon handling it as arrived. Some difficulty was experienced at first with crossmodulation between the ten meter station and the two meter link station which was at the same OTH. The six-meter relay

stations was suffering from a frozen rotator. This made it necessary to assign the six meter mobiles to the north end of town. Since coverage from the north is a little more difficult, the advantage of six meter ground wave superiority was appreciated. Four six meter operators took care of this assignment very capably. remaining part of the city was blanketed by the signals of ten meter mobils. As might be expected on a Sunday afternoon, the ten meter band was wide open and QRM threatened to upset the applecart. This threat was eliminated however when Jerry WONKG took it upon his self to put his big signal on the air and clear the frequency. This brought the consternation and disgust of some out-of-







town stations whose ungentlemenly conduct might make one curious as to whether or not they have ever heard of a charity such as the Heart Fund drive. I hope Omaha stations can never be accused of violating the principles of the fraternity.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 642 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS WEST HAR TFORD, CONN. FEB. 20, 1958 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT.

Off frequency and harmonic violations continue to require the attention of FCC monitors and ARRL Official Observers. Novices are urged to make careful tests with local amateurs to make sure that strong second harmonics are not being radiated in the 11, 5.4 and 7.4 Mc. frequency ranges. Others are asked to watch especially the ten and 15 meter phone band edges and the outer limits of all bands. Some amateurs depend too much on their own equipment, forgetting the possibility of drift of receiver and transmitter calibration. Band ed are unsafe places to work without extremely accurate frequency measuring equipment AR.

THERE IS MEDICINE IN YOUR TRANSMITTER

These complications of our lives create newer and greater responsibilities and in turn greater anxieties. The building, modification, and experimentation with radio is an excellent creative outlet for these tensions allowing the mind to escape from the pressure of personal responsibilities to family and Rest from nervous society. sion is our greatest medical ed at present. Functional symptoms produced solely by emotional stress and nervous exhaustion comprise a major part of the history of more than seventy-five percent of patients seen by the physicians of this country. Neuroses and psychoses fill more than half of our hospital beds and the majority are considered preventable by measures to reduce and allay anxiety. By filling this universal need, in the dual fields of creation and communication, radio serves an an ideal outlet for the release of the tensions which create functional symtoms and even, eventually, mental illness.

This is only one of the many dividends of pleasure and happiness offered by the exciting fun of giving pleasure, entertainment and help to others through radio.
