



DECEMBER PROGRAM

Following the practice of the last several years, the December meeting will be the annual Christmas party of the Radio Club. The Ak-Sar-Ben usual gifts will be provided by the Club and by the raffle money from our monthly raffles. In addition we are asking each member to bring a \$1.00 or more gift for the purpose of putting in the exchange. By your so doing you will assure each and every member of receiving at least one gift. This gift exchange is from members only, of course, as only paid up members can participate in the drawing at the Christmas party. Visitors to the Club that night do not need to bring any gift. Visitors are welcome as usual and, in fact, new members are welcome and those joining would be allowed to participate in the drawing.

The December meeting is also the annual meeting of the Ak-Sar-Ben Radio Club, Inc. and at this annual meeting will be the election of officers and members of the board of trustees. Your constitution calls for the

election of a president, a vice president, and four members of the board of trustees. The president serves a one-year term. followed by an automatic oneyear term as the immediate past president; the vice president serves a one-year term; and the board of trustee members elected by the membership serve a twoyear term. Once again the FCC has had to crack down on violation of amateurs running in excess of one kilowatt. While ARRL notes a high volume of Official Observer notices for violations such as out of band operation and harmonics, deliberate violation of regulations is not at all displaying good sportsmanship. Attitudes of club disapproval upon such practices perhaps could aid in nipping such abuses in the bud. Harmonics, splatter, key clicks and the like might be reduced with more critical signal reports. Let's police ourselves, and avoid FCC difficulties.

The Sandhills Amateur Club assisted the city police in patrolling the streets Halloween night. Police chief reports one of the quietest evenings for a number of years. 



ADMIRAL COMMISSIONS

Beginning January 1, 1960, an Admiral commission in the Great Navy of the State of Nebraska will be awarded by the Governor of Nebraska al the amateur radio clubs of Nebraska to any Ham who will contact one member of each of the radio clubs of Nebraska Foreign stations need contact only five. As this award is offered for the purpose of promoting the State of Nebraska and amateur radio in Nebraska. Nebraska Hams are disqualified. In order to apply for this certificate it is only necessary to send your log of the stations contacted to P. O. Box 626. Omaha I, Nebraska. U. S. stations are required to send two 4¢ stamps. Foreign stations need send no postage. Watch for the article in QST regarding this commission.

Even though the details are being handled by the fellows here in Omaha, this is a Nebr. amateur radio club project and will be handled in the name of the Nebraska amateur radio club rather than Ak-Sar-Ben Radio Club. We have contacted all of the clubs in Nebraska that we know of and have received from them their roster of members and hope that the will send us from time to time new members so as to keep our list up to date. We have so far run into 22 radio clubs. We are listing them below in
