He described the tools needed. This included standard items such as long-nose and diagonal pliers, screwdrivers, and a small soldering iron. Other handy tools are curved diagonal pliers for clipping leads in difficult-to-reach places, a circuit board holder for that "extra hand", and a solder sucker. Also useful is a set of small storage bins for holding parts. The containers will vary with the kit builder: plastic trays, tin muffin trays, a Styrofoam block, or even left-over egg cartons. A magnifier/lamp combination can also be handy, though Dar stated that some lamps using white LEDs made it

difficult to read resistor color codes.

Dar recommended stocking a supply of spare parts. While a kit manufacturer may include all the necessary parts, it's sometimes more convenient to replace a missing or defective component from personal supplies rather than wait for a part to arrive in the mail.

Next, he described a procedure for building the kit. Sort the components into the abovementioned trays and mark them off against a checklist to make sure



they're all there. Once everything is ready, start installing components as described in the assembly manual. Dar gave some suggestions on how to install components such as placing resistors so that the color code positions are consistent, capacitor values are easily readable, and diode polarities are correct. For kits that have toroids, he recommended winding them first, as many kit builders will keep putting off that task and never get around to finishing the project.

Dar stated that good soldering techniques can be a problem for beginners. Using slides, he described how to recognize good and bad solder joints and how to make the good ones. To prevent damage to transistors and diodes, he recommended placing a small heat sink on the lead between the semiconductor and the connection being soldered. Also, surface mount components require their own techniques: add soldering paste (which has a lower melting point) to the location, stick on the part, then use an embossing gun to melt the solder. He also stated that a toaster oven works great for removing surface mount components from commercial boards.

Once the kit is built, what if it doesn't work? Dar provided some tips on what to do in that situation. First, check your work; see if everything is properly installed. Look for diodes in backwards, resistors swapped, and bad solder connections. Get someone else to double-check it. Sometimes they'll see something that you'll miss. Also, some manufacturers provide phone consultation. Check the Internet for a solution. Sometimes just entering the model number and a brief description of the problem will result in a list of URLs with possible solutions. If all else fails, and the manual has a troubleshooting section and schematic diagrams, you may be able to locate the problem using a voltmeter or oscilloscope.

Dar covered a lot of interesting material during the meeting, more than can be described here, but paraphrasing his summation probably says it best: Radios are fun, and building them from kits add to the enjoyment.

In all, it was an excellent presentation and, as stated in the beginning of this article, educational for both beginners and experienced kit builders.
