# **Error-Free Compressed Code**



Adam KDØMMG explains error detection/correction.

It's a given that the better you understand your subject, the better you are at explaining it. So it was clear last month that Adam KDØMMG understood his subject very well. In this case, the subject was the coding techniques associated with Information Theory and was the topic of the November meeting.

The subject was a follow-up to Adam's talk earlier this year about cryptography (August, 2003 *Ham Hum*). The difference this time is that instead of hiding data, he talked about techniques to compress the data and ensure that nothing was lost in the transmission.

Adam started by describing Huffman coding: how it is generated and how it shows the relationship between the characters it is being used with. He used Morse Code as an example, as it is familiar to most hams. He pointed out that it uses run-length encoding (RLE) which takes up less space than a fixed length code such as ASCII. He then showed how Huffman encoding can be used to convert ASCII to a compressed RLE bit stream to reduce the time needed to send it. At the receiving end, the algorithm would be used to restore the ASCII representation. Adam stated that Huffman encoding lends itself not only to text, but also to images such as facsimile and JPG—anything with lots of repeating patterns. He also described the Lempel-Ziv-Welch (LZW) compression scheme, its history, and how it was used with GIFs and PDF files.

Adam then discussed the techniques for error detection and error correction used in digital communications. This included the earliest and simplest, such as repetition codes (send three times and pick the two that match) and parity bits. A parity bit is appended to each character and will be set high or low depending on if the number of binary ones is even or odd. If the parity doesn't match the count at the receiving end, the receiver can request that the character be retransmitted. He then went on to describe more complex systems that allow the receiving end to detect errors and correct them without having to ask for a retransmission. Hamming encoding is one such system; it uses three parity bits and matrix multiplication to reconstruct a defective byte. It has typically been used for maintaining RAM integrity and Internet communications, among others.

One drawback to the Hamming system is that it is only good for correcting single-bit errors. Adam stated that one of the solutions currently popular is Reed-Solomon encoding, which can detect and correct as much as 12 thousand bits of damage to a serial data stream. The algorithm is more complex than Hamming, but is fast and so is used in time-critical storage devices such as CDs, DVDs, and BLU-Ray.

In all, Adam gave an excellent presentation that was educational, stimulating, and resulted in a lengthy Q&A session afterwards.
