Many of you have given us your version of just why the former nets have been unsuccessful. Most of your comments add up to the fact that you want something more to do than merely a roll call and a few announcements. In order to give you what you want we plan to set up each net with not one man running it as was

done before, but with four to six men running each net in order to get the combined thoughts and combined efforts. Running a net with some real activity takes a lot of work. In addition to the net control it is planned to have at least regular alternate net two controls and one net manager. In these days of uncertainty it behooves us, therefore, to get on record so that we can get clearance with Civil Defense and therefore use you during such an emergency.

There is greater realization today than ever before on the part of Civil Defense officials statewide that com-

munications is almost the number one issue in event of disaster. Many supplies and services will be needed but without communications to direct them the supplies will set in the warehouses and people will just sit and wonder where to go. The state plan calls for many and varied nets each serving a purpose of statewide or local communi-These comments. cations. therefore, are not only for those in Omaha, Douglas for the entire County, but State of Nebraska. Get in touch with your Civil Defense officials to find out what you can do in the new statewide RACES plan. If your CD officials are unfamiliar with the situation, send in the card to P. O. Box 626 and we'll see that it gets in the right hands to get you the information as to what part you can play in our communication nets.

It all adds up to this - we know that you are ready to serve your country and your community should any need arise - you always have. You know that you are willing to serve in any such emergencyyou always have. It will make it a lot easier for us to get word to you if we have your name and call and to k where you can best do your bit if needed. Send in the card today!

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### HAM OF THE MONTH - LOU CUTLER, WØVLI (Vicious Little Indians)

Our Man of the Month, Major Lou Cutler, is an Architect with Henningson, Durham & Richardson. For a number of years he was employed as an hitect for the Eppley Hotel Chain.

He resides with his XYL and their cocker spaniel "Sandy" at 6227 Florence Blvd. Their family, two boys and two girls, are now married and away from home.
